America Supports You: Golfers say game good for vets' bodies, minds

WASHINGTON Maryland group is using its favorite game to positively affect combat-wounded veterans who served in Afghanistan or Iraq.

Members of the Salute Military Golf Association believe the rehabilitative benefits of golf can improve the mental and physical condition of wounded servicemembers returning from combat, Jim Estes, the group's founder, said on the organization's Web site.

"The SMGA believes that A every (servicemember) matters and should be given the opportunity to learn and improve his or her golf knowledge and skill," he said. "The SMGA will provide a venue and mentoring to this end."

Earlier this year, Estes and several other area pros, specifically trained to work with wounded veterans, started formalized golf clinics for wounded soldiers. Future similar events near military medical facilities in San Antonio and San Diego are in the

works. PGA of America and Disabled Sports USA sponsored the clinics. They are both supporters of America Supports You, a Defense Department program connecting citizens and corporations with military personnel and their families serving at home and abroad.

Salute Military Golf Association, which began as a therapeutic outlet for soldiers undergoing prolonged medical

treatment at Walter Reed Army Medical Center here, is a new supporter of the Defense Department program.

Estes began accompanying Walter Reed patients on weekly dinner outings arranged by one of his clients in 2004. This interaction showed him that servicemembers were eager to get back to sports like golf.

"Jim learned that some of the soldiers found something in golf they really seemed to need," said Ellen Kay, the organization's secretary. "Since

(2004), many wounded soldiers from Iraq and Afghanistan have been exposed to the rehabilitative properties of the game of golf through Jim's

efforts." In addition to providing veterans with instruction through clinics and personalized instruction, Salute Military Golf Association works to secure benefits like reduced or free green fees and access to public and private golf facilities throughout the country.

Larcenies have always been a big problem across the U.S. There has been an increasing problem of thefts aboard the base and especially in the barracks, which is an issue we have to strongly look at and find a way to address.

Out of the 77 larcenies, almost all of them could have been prevented or been a lot easier to solve if the person who had their property stolen would have secured the items properly, kept receipts of the merchandise or marked or engraved their property with a property marking for identification purposes. Also ensure that you write down and keep a record of all serial numbers and other identifiers of high dollar or sentimental merchandise and keep that list in a secure location. Most pawn shops will not take property that has property engraving markings on them.

Plaque unveiled in Times Square for Medal of Honor recipients

NEW YORK -- A bronze plaque listing New York state recipients of the Congresional Medal of Honor, the nation's highest military award for valor, was unveiled Nov. 10 in Times Square during a cere-

mony commemorating the

latest name added to the plaque: Marine Cpl. Jason Dunham. The ceremony was held on the Marine Corps' 232nd birthday, which is also Dunham's birthday. Marine Corps generals from the Pentagon, along with members of the New York Council of the Navy League of the United States, spoke of Dunham's

sacrifice, and award citation permanently displayed in was read, all through a public address system for Times Square visitiors to hear as well.

Dunham was posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor earlier this year for actions during Operation Iraqi Freedom in April 2004. The plaque will be

Professional books, papers, equipment

Professional books, papers, and equipment (PBP&E), also known as "pro-gear", are articles of household goods in a service member's possession needed for the performance of official duties at the next or a later destination. Service members executing Permanent Change of Station orders often fail to declare them. When properly listed on the packing inventory, PBP&E are not counted as part of your weight allowance.

Service members should estimate and declare the weight of PBP&E when the application for shipment of household goods is prepared by the Traffic Management Office. This constitutes an official declaration of intent to ship PBP&E. If the service member fails to declare PBP&E on the application for shipment and fails to ensure that it is indicated on the carrier's inventory and DD Form 619, no credit will be given.

Be sure to separate PBP&E from the rest of your personal property before the movers arrive so they may be packed, marked, and weighed

separately. Before signing the inventory by the movers check to make sure these items are listed properly and not simply as books or miscellaneous. The proper designation of these items and exclusion of the weight can be very important if you exceed your maximum weight allowance. The only instance when PBP&E will be credited after the fact is when the items were properly identified on the inventory, but the weight was not annotated.

PBP&E includes instruments, tools, and equipment peculiar to technicians, mechanics, and members of the professions, as well as reference books, papers, and materials required to perform official duties. You may also declare specialized clothing such as diving suits, aviator suits and helmets, band uniforms, vestments, and other apparel not considered to be normal or usual uniform or clothing. Individually owned or specially issued field clothing or equipment, official awards, and other memorabilia given to a service member by a uniformed service, professional society or organization, or a U.S. or foreign government may also be declared.

PPB&E does not include office, household or shop fixtures, furniture such as bookcases, study or computer desks, file cabinets, or sports equipment of any kind, even if used in conjunction.



GIS Day teaches Marines latest geographic technology

Marines and civilians gathered in interest looking at geographical and computerized maps during Geographic Information Systems Day outside the Main Exchange Wednesday.

GIS Day is held in November, on the Wednesday of Geography Awareness Week.

GIS Day is a global event when GIS members around the world open their doors to schools, companies, military installations and the general

According to their Web site, over 80 countries participated in the GIS day event holding open houses, showcases and hand-on events to teach people about what GIS is capable of.

The Web site states that many companies use GIS technology for choosing building sites, targeting market segments, planning distribution networks or responding to an emergency.

One of the main elements of GIS that many people have used is retrieving directions by

using an online map.

For the Combat Center, GIS has attached to several different units to ensure the highest level of safety and comfort for the Marines and sailors living aboard the base.

"GIS touches every aspect possible," said Rob M. Fleming, GIS and computer aided drafting specialist. "We hit utilities, route analysis, and incident tracking with the police and fire department. We can even do social tracking."

GIS provide training coordinators and range managers with maps and overlays containing geospatial information that is constantly being updated. The information GIS is constantly gathering helps establish safety guidelines for training Marines.

GIS also assists with communications and radio towers, ensuring they are built in the correct place so no matter what, units can keep in contact with each other and stay safe.

Marines deployed to Iraq receive route analyses from GIS, guaranteeing the safest traveling routes for moving Marines.

Incident and crime rate trackers are given to the Provost Marshals Office from GIS to help ensure the safety of Marines during their every-

"The GIS in San Diego worked a lot during the fires," said Fleming. "They mapped out the fires and took digital imagery of all the damages and burned areas. After the fires, they kicked out a report stating the damages to homes, forestry and habitats for the majority of animals in the area."

GIS also helps people through the utilities used in houses. If an electric blackout occurs, the GIS will quickly track it to the source so the electricity can be turned back on.

"We take care of stuff so everybody else's job runs smoothly," said Fleming. "There is never a dull moment in GIS. There is always something new, something to check out and implement in our job."

Knock, knock. Who's there? Solicitors over-stepping boundaries

A problem seems apparent in the housing areas from time to time, solicitors knocking on the doors of the residents.

Soliciting, whether it be door-to-door or by telephone, is strictly prohibited aboard the Combat Center.

"We simply don't permit it and we want to protect our residents from it," said Ray Zapata, Lincoln Military Housing administration manager. "Not only do the residents not have to entertain it, but we encourage them to report it.

"It happens far less on base than anywhere else," he added. "Most of the time, it's a dependent on the base who either doesn't know the rules or just decided to disregard them."

Zapata said the most recent reported case occurred approximately one month ago. Two solicitors selling vacuum cleaners were caught trying to sell their products door-todoor in the Vista del Sol housing area.

Records confirmed the company the pair worked for had been warned about trespassing in the past. Both solicitors were issued Department of Defense form 1805 for trespassing and escorted off base.

Wendy Latimore-Ferrell, Staff Judge Advocate paralegal review officer, said the form is the standard punishment for soliciting. Offenders will be escorted off the installation and risk being permanently barred from the base, which is defined by a persona non grata. Because of the area, a persona non grata applies to all Marine Corps installations in southern California.

Solicitors who cause problems while on base or who are repeat offenders here risk

being subject to a fine and possibly jail time. All cases are handled by the federal magistrate in Joshua Tree, Calif.

The Combat Center's stance toward soliciting is not only highlighted in the housing manual, there are also signs at the entrances to the housing areas clearly stating that soliciting is prohibited.

Cases don't occur often; reports are filed an average of once every six months. However, Zapata feels more cases are occurring, but residents are not reporting the incidents.

"You simply cannot trust these people knocking on your door trying to sell you something," he said. "You never know what you're bargaining

In the event of a solicitor, residents are advised not to open the door to them and to report the incident to the Provost Marshal's Office and Lincoln Military Housing.

Should a resident open the door to a solicitor, they are advised to find out who they are and who they work for, and report it immediately.



CCFD provides mutual aid to SB County

The Combat Center Fire Department has provided years of dedicated service to the Combat Center.

In addition, they cooperate with local fire departments and San Bernardino County to bring aid to southern California.

"We provide every service we do on base; medical aid, hazardous material calls, structure fires, vehicle fires, traffic accidents, etc.," said Assistant Fire Chief Sam Moore, CCFD training and communications chief. "When the weather gets bad during the rainy months, we work with Twentynine Palms Public Services for things like house floods and swift water rescues.

"We provide a lot of mutual aid to San Bernardino County," he added.

The CCFD has helped the community many times throughout the years. Moore said the department averages at least three to five off-base calls every month.

Their most recent notable encounter was the 2007 California wildfires. The CCFD dispatched a four-man engine crew to Lake Arrowhead, Calif., to assist other fire departments from across the West Coast to combat the blazes that devastated southern California for nearly two weeks.

"Whenever there are wildfires like that, the state gets bro-

ken up into zones," said Moore. "Each fire department in the zones sends a strike team to help fight the fires.

"In the 22 years that I've been here, the farthest they've sent us is Malibu, Calif.," he added.

The department has also assisted Joshua Tree National Park rangers in Joshua Tree, Calif., by providing fire crews to help perform over-the-side rescues for stranded hikers and climbers.

The CCFD even sent an engine crew to Los Angeles during the 1992 Los Angeles Riots to help extinguish several fires that were started during

The Combat Center's ambulances also provide San Bernardino County with support similar to the work they do on the installation.



Moore said firefighters will go to the schools for career days and set up static displays of fire engines at parades and open houses throughout the community. They also have a

Friends ease workload of Thanksgiving prep

Dreams of mom's beautifully browned turkey and all your holiday favorites can give you a serious case of the homesick blues this time of year. Just remember that mom herself had to start somewhere—and you can do it, too! The dishes included in the traditional Thanksgiving meal are really pretty simple, but trying to do it all yourself makes for a lot of hard work. That's why my very first tip is...

1. Invite lots of friends and put them to work. If the gathering will be at your house, it's only fair to count the effort it takes to make the place presentable as part of your contribution. That and cooking the turkey is plenty for your fair share. Cook the turkey onsite if at all possible—it's safer than

having it transported in somebody's trunk, plus if it takes a little longer than expected to get done, it won't cause any great problem. Make a basic menu and ask each friend what dish they'd like to contribute. Be flexible—their favorites and yours might not always match. Need a recipe? Come to Kay's Kitchen on the Web at http://www.commissaries.co m. Recipes for all the traditional favorites are ready and waiting for you. Have a few friends you'd rather not ask to cook? Assign them things they can get ready-made at the commissary—desserts of all kinds, including pumpkin pies, freshly baked breads from the bakery, or a fruit or veggie tray from the produce section. Don't have enough plates to go around? Assign that to a guest, too. Your commissary has plenty of paper and plastic plates, platters, utensils, even white paper tablecloths fit for a

2. Buy the right amount. You will need about a half to three-quarters of a pound per person for a regular bone-in turkey, and about a third of a pound per person for a boneless breast or turkey roast. Allow a little more, if you want plenty of leftovers.

3. Buy ahead to allow for thaw time. Depending on the size of the turkey, you'll need about two to five days to allow for complete thawing. Place the frozen turkey on a tray in the refrigerator and allow five hours per pound to complete the thawing process. The night before your feast is not the time to be buying your turkey, but if you're caught in this dilemma, thaw by the cold water method. With the turkey in its original wrapper, place it in a large container and cover completely with cold water. Change the water every 30 minutes and allow one hour per pound total thawing time.

4. Waste not, want not. Having some leftovers to deal with once the meal is finished is a Thanksgiving tradition, too, so have clean containers on hand to divide what's left among the guests to take home. Keep these portions refrigerated until guests are ready to leave. If the turkey carcass will be used for soup or stock, remove the meat from the bones immediately after the meal is finished and refrigerate separately. Prepare the soup or stock as soon as possible—even Thanksgiving night. The longer it sits in the refrigerator, the less likely it is to ever see the inside of a soup pot!

5. Put food safety first. To avoid contaminating other foods with harmful bacteria from the raw turkey, wash hands, cutting boards, utensils and work surfaces with hot soapy water immediately after coming in contact with the uncooked turkey. Roast the turkey in an oven set no lower than 325 degrees Fahrenheit, and use a food thermometer to check for doneness. Do this even if your turkey has a "popup" temperature indicator. A whole turkey is safe when cooked to a minimum internal temperature of 165 degrees. For quality purposes, allow the roasted turkey to stand for 20 minutes before carving, but refrigerate promptly—as soon as the meal is over. Discard any turkey, stuffing and gravy left out at room temperature longer than two hours. Divide leftovers into small portions, store in shallow covered containers and refrigerate promptly. Use refrigerated turkey and stuffing within three to four days and use gravy within one

to two days. 



Shingles vaccine available to TRICARE beneficiaries age 60 plus

FALLS CHURCH, Va. -Following a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommendation on October 19. TRICARE now covers Zostavax, the vaccine designed to prevent shingles for beneficiaries 60 and older.

Shingles is a painful viral disease that affects more than one million Americans every year. More than half of those cases happen in people age 60 or older. The CDC recommends a single dose of shingles vaccine for everyone age 60 and older.

In a shingles prevention study done by the Veterans Administration Cooperative Trial, run by Dr. Michael Oxman out of the University

of California, San Diego, Zostavax was more than 50 percent effective in reducing the incidence of shingles and more than 60 percent effective in reducing some of its associated symptoms. Even in people who suffer from the disease, most of those who were vaccinated experienced less pain.

"Offering this vaccine to our beneficiaries is further evidence of TRICARE's commitment to provide firstrate health care to Uniformed Service members and their families," said Army Major General Elder Granger, Deputy Director, TRICARE Management Activity. "We cover all immunizations recommended by the CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices and formally endorsed and adopted by the CDC."

Beneficiaries who receive the shingles vaccine after October 19, must have vaccinations administered in a provider's office. Zostavax is covered under the TRICARE medical benefit and is not reimbursable under the pharmacy benefit. Beneficiaries with coverage or claims questions should contact the TRICARE regional claims processor found on their beneficiary explanation of benefits (EOB) notice.

Shingles is caused by the varicella-zoster virus, the same virus that causes chickenpox in children. It remains in the body for decades, sleeping in nerve cells along the spinal column. A shingles rash usually appears on one side of the face or body and lasts

between two and four weeks. It is painful and can be accompanied by fever, headache, chills and upset



great time," he said. The Toys For Tots Golf Tournament and Turkey Shoot Golf Tournaments are shaping up to be some of the best the Course has seen in years.



CompTIA creating Futures Program preparing military veterans for new careers in technology

Oakbrook Terrace, November 12, 2007-A program established and supported by members of the Technology Computing Association Industry (CompTIA) is helping to address the nation's need for new employment opportunities for military veterans.

Creating Futures, an initiative of the CompTIA Education Foundation, is providing career opportunities to groups who have historically been under-represented in the IT workforce, including veterans transitioning out of the military. The program works with employers to identify their hiring needs, then tailors education and training programs to help individuals obtain the

Training and employment programs like Creating Futures are especially important today, as veterans of the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan leave the service only to encounter problems with housing, poverty and unemployment when they return home. The Veterans Affairs Department said earlier this month that it is bracing for a new surge in the homeless veterans in the years ahead.

"Veteran's Day is a time for reflection on the service and sacrifice that the men and women of the U.S. armed forces have given to our nation," said John Venator, president and chief executive officer, CompTIA. "Now, as many of these brave individuals return to civilian life, it is incumbent

These include costs for tuition, fees, books, equipment, and credentialing and





HABBANIYAH, Iraq --Columns of dust rise from a pebble-covered expanse of sand as Iraqi men weave, sprint and maneuver a soccer ball to the end of the pitch toward a netted goal, manned by a lone goal keeper.

Only a year ago, this level of organization in a soccer game, called football in Iraq and everywhere else outside of the United States, would have been anything but ordinary in this small corner of Anbar Province, called Iraq, Habbaniyah. It was once the hiding place and terror grounds of an insurgency. Now, this area is an example for the rest of Iraq, and the soccer game is an Iraqi way to blow off steam after a hard day's work.

Approximately 20 teams from the communities around the Habbaniyah area, which is about nine miles west of Fallujah, have created a local soccer league, and recently begun competing in their first soccer season here since spring, 2003.

The league is now a reality because of the peace that has spread throughout the region due to the increased capabilities of Iraqi Security Forces, along with the guidance and Muslim,' 'I am Christian,' 'I am aid of Coalition Forces.



Spouses of active-duty servicemembers grades E1 through E5 and O1 to O3 will be eligible to participate. They must have a high school or general education diploma.

Gates said the program will provide the much-needed help many spouses need to pursue rewarding careers despite frequent career disruptions. "Thousands are called on to pack up and relocate the family, often at the cost of their own careers," he said. "This makes it difficult to navigate the career licensure and certification requirements that go with most professions.

"In addition, education is often unaffordable for young families who must also bear the expense of child care," he said.

Gates called the new initiative another step in ful-

Defense filling the Department's commitment to its servicemembers and their families. "We owe it to our brave men and women in uniform to assist their families as they do their job, often thousands of miles from their homes and families and under extremely hazardous conditions," he said. "When servicemembers find time to call home or e-mail home, they shouldn't have to worry. They have the right to hear their loved ones honestly say, 'We miss you, but we are doing fine."

Chao said the program will give the 77 percent of military spouses who report wanting or needing to work an opportunity to forge careers in fields that provide the most opportunity now and in the future.

Workers in these highdemand occupations will be able to pick up and move with their loved ones' assignments, but still continue building their own careers, she said. She noted that with the trend toward a knowledge-based economy, two-thirds of the new careers will require some post-secondary education or training.

Chao said military families serve as the backbone of the fighting force. "Our military could not do its job without your support," she told spouses at today's ceremony. "As they say in the military, you are missionessential. And that's what this initiative is all about."

Twenty-five-year-old Gwen Bates, wife of Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Alexander Bates, said she hopes to be among the first military spouses to take advantage of the new program. Living in San Diego, where her husband is assigned, with the couple's three children, Bates said her family hasn't had extra cash to put toward her education. "This has been my stumbling block. I've been at a crossroads," she said.

Bates said the new initiative will offer exactly what she needs to build on the associate's degree she already has to get a bachelor's degree in pre-medicine, then go on to medical school. "This is the reinforcement I need to finally go ahead and get the show on the road," she said.

With the initiative beginning as a demonstration program, Bates said she's hopeful it will expand to include more spouses military-wide. "There are so many people like me," she said.

She called the new initiative an example of the Defense Department making good on its pledge of support to its military families. "It shows they actually care," she said.
