# **MCAGCC Marines take new Combat Fitness Test for trial run**

The Marine Corps prides itself on the physical fitness standards held throughout the ranks, but is the bi-annual Physical Fitness Test enough to prove a Marine's capabilities?

According to White Letter 05-07, written by Gen. James T. Conway, Commandant of the Marine Corps, the PFT is no longer enough to test a Marine's physical capacity for all physical skills a Marine may need to succeed on the battlefield.

After White Letter 05-07 was published by Conway, the Marine Corps Training and Education Command at Marine Corps Base Quantico, Va., began the development of the Combat Fitness Test, which will more closely replicate the physical demands of combat than a PET

"Tasks that make up the CFT

will have linkage to Marine common combat skills," said Col. Brian McGuire, Combat Fitness Test Development officer-incharge, TECOM. "Additionally, CFT events will have a low degree of technicality such that it will be more of a fitness test than it is of acquired skill.

"Though the PFT is a good general test of overall fitness, the CFT will provide commanders an assessment of a Marine's overall combat conditioning," he added. "Practicing for the test is practicing for combat."

The CFT begins with an 880-yard run, known as movement to contact, an ammunition lift test and a maneuver-under-fire event. During the ammunition lift, the Marines will lift a 30-pound ammunition can from shoulder-height to overhead, fully extending their arms each time. They must complete as many repetitions of this exercise as they can within two minutes.

The final portion of the CFT, maneuver under fire, requires Marines to travel 300 yards by sprinting, completing a modified low crawl, and weave through a series of cones designed to simulate barbed wire and other obstacles.

Once they reach the end of the cones, the Marines must evacuate a mock casualty by executing a buddy-drag halfway through the obstacles. Then they must fireman carry the casualty back to the ammunition cans.

After the Marines carry the casualty back to the ammunition cans, they must carry the ammunition cans back through the cones to the casualty zone, where they must throw a hand grenade.

If the grenade hits the designated target area, five seconds is deducted from the Marine's time. If they miss, five seconds are added to their overall time. Then they must pick up the ammunition cans and run back to the starting point.

McGuire said scoring for the CFT will be similar to the PFT. However, since the test is still in development, the specifics of the scoring have not been finalized. Scored options as well as pass or fail options will be presented to the commandant for decision.

Testing for the CFT will be conducted in seven military installations worldwide. The Combat Center was the third stop on this route. The Marine Corps Communications-Electronics School and 7th Marine Regiment participated in the testing when it came to the Combat Center Feb. 5-8.

Sgt. Maj. Dave C. Howell, 7th Marine Regiment sergeant major, took part in the test.

"The CFT is long overdue because many aspects of combat conditioning are ignored, and Marines rely on field training alone to prepare for arduous activities," said Howell. "The CFT should act as a conduit that assists and guides Marines in their daily conditioning routine."

Howell went on to say the CFT is a challenging and rewarding test that complements the PFT because it evaluates Marines in areas that the PFT misses.

The CFT will not replace the PFT. Instead, it will be run in conjunction with the PFT. It will also count toward promotion and retention for lance corporals, corporals and sergeants. McGuire said the CFT and PFT will also not be run on the same day.

Overall, the Combat Center Marines who participated in the CFT seemed to approve of its ability to physically challenge Marines.

"When you first see it set up, it looks easy, like anyone can do it, but once you get started, it's actually really exhausting," said Lance Cpl. Raphael Fritschraudser, rifleman, 4th Platoon, Kilo Company, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment. "It



# PREP provides tools for strong relationships, marriages

The Prevention and Relationship Enhancement Program's Fighting for your Marriage workshop kicks off Feb. 28 at the Combat Center's Protestant Chapel from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

PREP is not group therapy; it is an educational and practical application opportunity to help couples learn what makes marriages and relationships work.

Engaged and married couples are given the opportunity to spend two days learning to properly communicate, handle conflict and promote intimacy, said Lt. Terry Moran, Marine Corps Communication-Electronics School chaplain.

The program was founded by doctors Howard J. Markman, Scott Stanley and Susan L. Blumberg, authors of "Fighting for your Marriage," that was written after more than 20 years of research.

The class previously lasted

three days, but three days was too much time away from work and training, said Moran.

"Now the classes are condensed to only two days; Thursday and Friday," said Moran. "We're hoping the different commands [aboard the Combat Center] will allow their Marines to attend classes now that they're shorter. The communication kills learned in the classes can easily be used in the work environment as well."

Another subject covered in the class is friendship.

"We encourage couples to plan to have fun to keep their friendship alive and well," said Moran. "We encourage couples to have fun like they did before they were married and settled down with a job and children."

Other topics like sensuality and sexuality, personality, money matters, and forgiveness are also covered in the class.

After a series of studies, researchers found that couples who took the class had lower

breakup rates, were more likely to five years later. maintain satisfaction up to a few years after the program, and were more likely to show lower levels of negative interaction and higher levels of positive interaction up to

The PREP workshop will be held four more times this year after the February class.

The next classes will be offered May 22 and 23, July 24

and 25, Sept. 25 and 26, and Oct. 30 and 31. A PREP class based on Biblical principles will be offered April 24 and 25.

really tests your physical agility better than a PFT does."

Other Marines said the CFT is as intense, challenging and more applicable in a combat environment than a PFT. Many also said the CFT was a fun, enjoyable workout.

McGuire reported that efforts put toward setting up the testing by MCCES and 7th Marine Regiment, along with overall motivation, was exceptional.

"The Marines who participated in CFT testing, from the leaders of the units, to the monitors and to the participants themselves did an outstanding job," he said.

McGuire also said input received from the participants will enable CFT refinements as the data collection phase proceeds.

"The CFT is not yet finalized, so even though times and reps (repetitions) on proposed events are important in this phase, just as important is the feedback we get from Marines who have taken the test," he said.


The next stop on the CFT testing route is Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego, Calif. Visits to Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune, N.C. and Okinawa, Japan, will follow. TECOM will continue to develop and perfect the CFT before it is implemented Marine Corps-wide later this year.

HAWTHORNE ARMY DEPOT, Nev. – There's not much that can stand in the way of U.S. Marines nowadays.

Walls, buildings and even complex terrain haven't been much of a match for Marines lately. In fact, Marines are still honing their field skills to overcome these obstacles more conveniently and effectively.

From Feb. 1–6, Marines and sailors with Embedded Trainer Teams conducted training operations in the mountainous terrain of Hawthorne, Nev., and enhanced their driving capabilities in up-armored humvees.

The teams were trained in driving techniques that allows them to maximize the capabilities of their combat-ready humvees in unforgiving mountainous terrain so they can carry out missions and operations in their upcoming deployment to Afghanistan.

Keith Whitlow, lead driving instructor with Back Country Driving School, and his group of instruc tors taught the Marines these vital driving techniques on terrain aboard Hawthorne Army Depot's training grounds.

"From what I'm told this area is very similar to the terrain in Afghanistan," said Whitlow. "We're showing the

Marines how they can maneuver through steep inclines and declines with comfort. They need to know the capabilities of the humvees so they can maintain control of where they're going during [combat] operations when they're in Afghanistan's hills."

The teams, made up of Marines and sailors serving with 3rd Marine Division, are training to become military advisors for the Afghan National Army. They're tasked with mentoring, training and assisting the Afghan soldiers during combat operations so they can become a self-efficient military force.

"Since we'll mostly be conducting convoy operations, it's crucial we learn and understand the capabilities of the vehicle," said Lt. Col. Anthony Terlizzi, the officer-in-charge of ETT 4-3. "This is the best humvee training we've ever received."

The lessons included breaking, throttle modulation, maneuvering over rocks, humps, ditches and washes, and steep ascents

and descents.

"We are the best qualified driving instructors for these humvees," said Whitlow. "We know the machines inside and out. We're basically teaching the Marines the week points and the strong points of the humvees. Our job is to familiarize them with off-road driving the proper way."

Marines spent three days on this training course driving all around Hawthorne's mountains. At 6,000 feet elevation, they climbed steep hills most four-wheel-drive trucks can't handle, said Whitlow.

And, for training purposes, the teams intentionally caused a humvee to get stuck. The instructors taught lessons on vehicle recovery by properly using cables to tow out the humvees.

"The lessons were very valuable," said Terlizzi, a native of Melbourne, Australia. "We got a lot of hands-on training and lessons on preventative maintenance. The Marines were really able to learn and understand everything they showed us. I think we're ready to go."

# **Avoiding liberty disasters at Mt. San Jacinto State Park**

Planning to hike the trails or lounge around the campgrounds of Mount San Jacinto State Park this weekend?

While this may sound like a fun way to spend a day or two, there are a number of precautions one must follow to avoid turning a relaxing walk in the woods into a recreational disaster.

"A large problem with folks, especially from the Twentynine Palms area, is they don't know what they're getting into," said Kjer Sahl, California State Parks ranger, Long Valley Ranger Station, Mount San Jacinto State Park. "My concern is that they may not be familiar with the mountain. They may not have the proper gear or aren't used to the terrain up here."

The Long Valley Ranger Station, which is located in the Long Valley picnic area of the park, provides a checklist of the "ten essentials" free of charge to all park patrons. The items are; a map and compass, extra food and water, sun protection, a fire starter, matches in a waterproof container, extra clothing and rain protection, a pocket knife, a first aid kit, a flashlight with extra batteries and bulbs, and a whistle.

It is also advised to carry personal identification and emergency medical information on one's person at all times while in the park.

"In case something happens, you want to have all the equipment you need to keep yourself alive," said Sahl. "You should always be prepared for the worstcase scenario."

Sahl also said there are other ways patrons should prepare themselves before they embark

on their outdoor excursions.

"Being prepared isn't just about having all the proper gear, it's about being knowledgeable about the terrain, weather and trail conditions," she said. "Although it's a small mountain, it's very easy to get lost here. It's a very different topography with a lot of ravines."

In order to prepare, people can call the Long Valley and Idyllwild, Calif., ranger stations for information regarding the weather and trail conditions at 327-0222 or (951) 659-2606 respectively.

The Long Valley Ranger Station also provides topographical and hiking maps for only \$1. The topographical map shows the varying terrain of the park as well as the locations of the trails and campgrounds. The hiking map more clearly outlines the trails and campgrounds for park patrons.

In addition to the maps and the "ten essentials," wilderness safety tips are highly stressed to ensure a fun-filled hiking excursion does not become a rescue mission. Prior planning, which includes checking the weather conditions, is extremely important. It is also advised to notify a friend or family member of your trip so they can contact the authorities if you do not return as planned.

While in the park, it is important to stay on the trails, only hike during daylight hours and do not hike alone. If you get lost, or

believe you are lost, it is imperative you stay in one place. It is much easier to find a stationary person. Make yourself as visible as possible by moving to a clear area and wearing the brightest clothing possible. Finally, blow your whistle. Three whistle blasts Mountain Station at 8,516 feet, is the signal indicating distress.


Another thing to remember if you plan to explore the trails and campgrounds is to obtain the proper permits. Wilderness and camping permits can be obtained at the Long Valley Ranger Station.

If you just want to spend a relaxing day in the Long Valley picnic area, there is another way to reach your destination. The Palm Springs Aerial Tramway Station, which is located in Chino




The tram takes you to the which is only a short walk from Long Valley. The Mountain Station also features a restaurant, gift shop, snack bar and a state park visitor center.





## MWSS-374 conducts helicopter recovery, other pre-deployment training

Marine Wing Support Squadron 374 conducted "Rhino Charge," a training exercise designed to prepare the Marines and sailors for their upcoming deployment from Feb. 4 through 8.

The training included nonlethal weapons instruction training, a mock helicopter crash off of the airfield and an evening tactical convoy through an Iraqi village at the Combat Center's Range 225, transporting the wrecked helicopter.

The training focused on the

helicopter crash and the efficiency of the Marines and sailors securing and removing the helicopter from the hostile environment and returning it to their forward operating base dubbed "Seagle."

Under simulated enemy fire, the Marines and sailors of the Tactical Recovery of Aircraft Personnel and the Medical Team were able to move swiftly, securing the site and evacuating the wounded within hours of the crash.

"It is important to train for TRAP missions," said Gunnery Sgt. Mark Dumdie, staff noncommissioned officer-in-charge of Crash, Fire and Rescue. "We

have to make sure we bring the crash and if the helicopter was learn different ways to recover right amount of security, personnel and equipment."

Sgt. Glenn Begg, military police for MWSS-374 and assistant convoy chief for the helicopter security team agreed with Dumdie.

"This is something we will be doing on a normal routine," said Begg. "Training like this covers all the bases. Being out here puts you in an element you will witness in Iraq."

After evacuating roll players simulating wounded aircraft personnel, the Mishap Board Investigation Team entered the area to determine the cause of the worth saving.

"After we looked at the crash site, we determined the helo (helicopter) was salvageable," said Dumdie. "We had to pick up the bird and place it on a flat bed and bring it back to Seagle."

The Marines and sailors loaded and unloaded the helicopter onto the flat bed a couple of times to practice different techniques to load a crashed helicopter in a tactical environment.


"If we were actually taking fire from enemies I would want to recover the aircraft the fastest way possible," said Chief Warrant Officer 2 Matthew Wieczorek, Expeditionary Airfield services officer.

Wieczorek continued to say that the Marines and sailors are going through the training to

a helicopter, and to teach others their techniques and give others an opportunity to learn from their fellow Marines own experiences.

After running through multiple ways to load the damaged helicopter onto the flat bed, the Marines and sailors convoyed the helicopter through a simulated enemy infested Iraqi village before returning to the FOB.

The long week MWSS-374 endured has taught them multiple techniques on retrieving a helicopter from tactical environments and tested the medical and TRAP teams on evacuating wounded helicopter personnel in a timely manner while preparing MWSS-374 for their upcoming deployment in March.


