# 'First Team' stays mission ready

Marines with Company C, 1st Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment, Special Purpose Marine Air Ground Task Force-Crisis Response-Central Command conducted a mission readiness exercise at an undisclosed location in Southwest Asia Nov. 23-24.

SPMAGTF-CR-CC is currently deployed in support of Operation Inherent Resolve, which focuses on defeating the Islamic State of Iraq and Levant in the U.S. Central Command area of responsibility.

The training exercise consisted of a scenario where a forward operating base in the area of responsibility required SPMAGTF-CR-CC reinforcement as part of its crisis response mission spanning 20 nations in the U.S. Central Command area of responsibility.

The 2-day drill allowed the Marines to hone their responsive and reinforcement skills.

"[What] we are trying to get out of this is to gauge how responsive our company is, the standards we are looking for is six hours," said U.S. Marine 1st Lt. Philip Whitaker, the executive officer for Co. C, 1/7. "From notification to tasking, we have six hours to do a rapid playing process, get the Marines embarked on MV-22 [Ospreys] and come in and reinforce."

During the exercise, Marines sharpened capabilities

# EOD kicks off advanced course

The first Advanced Explosive Ordnance Disposal, Ordnance Exploitation Course, hosted by the EOD Advanced Training Center, began aboard the Combat Center, Nov. 30, 2015.

Eight select Marine EOD officers and enlisted members gathered from various Marine Corps installations to participate in the three-week course, covering professional military education and practical application missions designed to develop skills in ordnance exploitation.

range of ranks, sergeant to lieutenant colonel, were selected based on their EOD experience level.

"EOD Marines have been exploiting ordnance since the early 1940's, but there's never been a particularly standardized process," Barker said.

According to Barker, the course works to standardize the process throughout the Marine Corps.

"This formalized teaching of tools and procedures allows every unit in the fleet to be on the same page," said Master Sgt. Erik

"There are three basic techniques for exploitation: disassembly, stripping and inerting operations," said Master Gunnery Sgt. Dan Barker, staff non-commissioned officer in charge, Marine Corps Communication-Electronics School. "The overall intent behind the course is to set a standard for Marine EOD technicians to safely and efficiently exploit both foreign and domestic ordnance."

Swanson, guest instructor, Marine Corps Air Station Miramar. "Marines can apply these methods and techniques to whatever they might encounter on the battlefield."

One of the biggest challenges instructors expect for participants is the compressed timeline of the training.

"It's a very complex set of skills they're expected to learn quickly," Swanson said. "Each student

# PMO offers lost, found service

It happens from time to time; a Marine returns from unit physical training only to realize he left his wallet or ID at the track. What should he do when he returns to find his item missing?

Fortunately, the Provost Marshal's Office offers a lost and found for Combat Center personnel and residents who have lost an important item or are trying to return valuable property to its owner.

"It's important for personnel to know that the lost and found is here and they can drop off missing valuables with the desk sergeant," said Cory Ottum, physical security specialist, Provost Marshal's Office. "The desk sergeant is present 24/7 for those turning in lost items. For those looking to reclaim a lost object, our hours are between 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m."

According to Ottum, the majority of items turned in are credit cards, IDs, driver

licenses, wallets and occasionally pieces of jewelry. Additionally, PMO receives objects collected by Marine Corps Community Services on a monthly basis.

"When you see something missing and don't know what to do with it; bring it in," said Ottum. "Things we don't take include disposable items such as used clothing and anything that has no value to the owner or is easily replaceable. Weapons and knives are turned into the Criminal Investigative Division for screening and are then disposed of."

The process of claiming an item simply requires the person to describe in detail any distinguishing markings or features. Showing a picture or marking the item with name and contact information prior can accelerate the process further.

## WHAT I'VE LEARNED

# James Wild Rose, Wis. Non-commissioned officer in charge, Detachment A, Marine Unmanned Aerial Vehicle Squadron 1. Age: 22

## MARKER

Sgt. Marker began participating in shooting competitions in 2013 and is two awards away from becoming a double distinguished marksman.

>I grew up shooting and always enjoyed it. My dad was in the Marine Corps in the '80's and was passionate about it. He started teaching me when I was five and we would shoot cans off the back porch.

>I enjoy shooting because I like challenging myself. I have never shot a perfect 250 on the annual rifle qualification. It comes down to how good you can get. Can you get past those obstacles? People who play sports are always trying to be faster or stronger, shooters are always trying to be more accurate.

>I feel like I'm testing myself every single time I go to the range. Different ranges have different conditions you have to compensate for. Every time you compete, it is a different set of obstacles you have to tackle to take a good shot.

>I did not start shooting competitively until November of 2013. I was part of the range as a block non-commissioned officer, and shot in the intermural competition. I was recruited for the base shooting team after the match. I have participated in six different competitions, each one multiple times.

>My favorite part about being part of the team is seeing how much I can improve. We preach on the shooting team, that although we shoot individually it is a team. If you do well as a team the individual awards will come.

>In the past year I was coaching the base team, a team from Combat Logistics Battalion 7 and a team from 3rd Light Armored Reconnaissance Battalion. My focus was on the base team because they would have the opportunity

to go into bigger competitions but I still coached about 30 people to shoot competitively.

>It was a huge undertaking and was an overwhelming experience. We still ended up taking the pistol trophy during the bases big shooting competition and I saw all the people I coached improve throughout the year. That is my most significant accomplishment while I have been on the shooting team.

>Being a part of the shooting team lets me translate all my experience as a kid into the big leagues where people of all ranks compete. Everybody's dream while competing is to put all 10 shots through one hole, but that can't happen. We all try to achieve that and that is why I enjoy shooting.

>I'm working to become a distinguished marksman. If I can do that in the Marine Corps then I'm distinguished as a civilian too. If I can win a silver or gold for both the pistol and the rifle in the next competition, I will become a double distinguished marksman.

>There are so few people who have achieved double distinguished in the Marine Corps that it has become my goal before I get out.

>My favorite gun to shoot is the M110 rifle. It is basically an M16 with a scope and shoots 7.62 mm rounds. It is a comfortable rifle and because it is so similar to the M16, it is a gun I'm familiar with.

>When I get down to take a shot, I try and block the extra stuff like I'm thirsty or its cold. I focus on important things like whether my buttstock is in the right place, do I have good eye relief and do I have a round



in the weapon.

>Next, I tell myself that this is going to be a good shot. If you tell yourself that it isn't going to be a good shot then it won't be.

>Marksmanship from the farther shooting lines is fun because of all the things you have to take into account to ensure you can

take a good shot. That is challenging and I enjoy pushing myself as far as possible to get those hard shots.

>Shooting is not something that I want to lose after I get out of Marine Corps. There are plenty of competitions that I can participate in and I will most definitely continue shooting when I get out.

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# Marines get creative at Wood Hobby Shop

The sound of drills and saws reverberating against metal walls do little to distract 1st Lt. Kyle Repetti, platoon commander, Marine Corps Communication-Electronics School. His focus is centered on his current project; a board of plywood, the humble beginnings of a bedframe.

At the Combat Center's Wood Hobby Shop, Marines, sailors and family members, above the age of 16, are provided with the tools and the assistance needed to create anything they set their minds to.

"Here at the Wood Hobby Shop, we have all the tools the guys are going to need from start to finish," said Robert Henry, recreation safety specialist supervisor, Marine Corps Community Services. "Literally any project you can think of can be done here."

The projects made at the shop vary from simple plaques, awards and cutting boards to more complex woodwork designs such as kayaks, canoes, wooden chests and bed frames.

"Since I was stationed here I've made a bed frame, two nightstands and a wooden box," Repetti said. "It

is definitely a good hobby and a way to help out your command. I've worked on several projects for going away and retirement presents. It's a whole lot cheaper than having to buy a present."

For those interested in woodworking, the shop has tools needed to build, repair or modify their own wooden crafts and hobby items.

"It's usually cheaper to build your bookshelf or your entertainment center than it is to buy it," Henry said. "You're the one that built it so you know how it's constructed and you know how to fix it."

Many of the projects that can be made at the Wood Hobby Shop also serve as presents for holidays or retirements.

"I started woodworking after I retired from the Marine Corps and I didn't know this place existed until after that," said Carl Vanderzee, family readiness officer, Marine Wing Support Squadron 374. "One of the first things I made at the shop was a tea box for my mother. It's something that four years later is still a topic of conversation. It's a skill we are losing in America and who doesn't love a handmade gift?"

Even the simplest of designs tests one's problem solving skills when finding the right placement of the

pieces. For many, it's a great way to keep their mind active during off hours.

"It's a healthy alternative to sitting in the barracks and playing video games," Vanderzee said. "As far as a hobby, it helps you develop skills and it's just great knowledge to have."

In addition to providing tools and assistance, the shop also provides a laser engraving service.

"Our laser engraving pretty much beats our competitors across the board as far as price," Henry said. "We do our engraving while you wait and our completion time is usually about 30 minutes from when you walk in the door."

A fee of 10 dollars per day covers the use of tools and machines with wood also available for purchase. To get started at the shop, patrons must first attend a free safety class held on Wednesdays at 6 p.m. and Saturdays at 11 a.m.

"Once you go through the free safety shop, we turn you loose and you can build whatever you would like," Henry said. "We have staff on hand to help walk you through your project for those who have little to no experience."

such as quick reaction force employment, patrol operations, and emplacement and reinforcement of defensive positions.

“One of the things we worked on was our troop tasking when we first got here,” said U.S. Marine Sgt. Cole D. Parkison, an assault section leader with Co. C, 1/7. “We worked on how to get organized as far as posts and rotations and how we would be able to run an element standing post, an element on QRF and an element out on patrol at the same time.”

The 1/7 Marines identified key components and mission critical capabilities

when responding in support of the simulated forward operating base.

“We hadn’t loaded that much [gear] into an Osprey before,” said Parkison. “So being able to do that lets us know what we can bring and what is feasible and what’s not feasible.”

The exercise also integrated different assets needed to support a forward operating base.

“There is more than just the infantry side, there is detailed integration that has to happen with the [Marine Medium Tiltrotor] squadron and our company,



also, the Law Enforcement detachment is out here working entry check point procedures with our guys,” said Whitaker. “In addition to that, we had an aerial delivery to test the survivability of air dropping water and food to us. So it does integrate the whole MAGTF, the command element, logistics command element, ground command element and aviation command element.

Throughout the duration of the exercise, the Marines also responded to different threats, such as indirect fire, improvised explosive devices and probing and

harassing attacks in the vicinity of the FOB.

The exercise provided the Marines of 1/7 with hands-on experience to tactically execute rapid response missions.

“I am glad that we got to come out here and do this because it gives me a better idea of what I need to work on with my guys to make them more proficient on these kind of operations,” said Parkison. “It’s one thing to talk about it and come up with the greatest plan in the world, but when you come out here, you find out what actually works and what doesn’t.”

studies explosive characteristics, exploitation, and completes an operational risk assessment for each piece of ordnance.”

Marines will work in teams of four and will be allotted a six-hour window during each day of the two-week practical application period.

“Our primary tool is a military fuze disassembly kit, which allows Marines to perform some processes remotely including taking apart fuses,” Swanson

said. “We’ll also use X-ray radiographic systems to get a picture of the inside of the ordnance.”

The course is scheduled to conclude Dec. 18 and will challenge the technicians to their limits in precision and knowledge in EOD.

“We hope to instill the idea that they not only need to beat the item, but be safe in doing so and plan accordingly to meet the timeline,” Barker said.

Joe is truly a tough minded optimist who is demonstrating what it means to use your time, talent, and experience in an effective way after retirement.

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

# Ho-Ho-Hokum

'Love the Coopers' is snow-covered Christmas gloom

In the early moments of this sprawling Christmas comedy, characters somehow appear to end up "inside" a snow globe, frolicking in the crystalline white flakes.

There's a lot of snow in *Love the Coopers*; the stuff never stops falling. I was surprised by the end of the movie that it hadn't shut down every road in Coopersville, or Cooperstown, or Coopers Knob, or wherever it is the story takes place. Instead, like a gigantic snow globe, the movie just seems to regenerate the same precipitate, shaking it up over and over again—so it doesn't pile up, it just flies around and re-lands, making everything look like a big, fluffy white winter wonderland, snow on snow.

*Love the Coopers* indeed looks like a picture-perfect Christmas: sumptuous cookies and cupcakes, colorfully coordinated sweaters, coats and scarves, holiday carolers, red poinsettias, green mistletoe, twinkling lights on impeccably trimmed trees. Even the dogs are decorated.

But all the cheery Christmas decorations cover up a big, dysfunctional mess: The Coopers are falling apart, in just about every way. Mom Charlotte (Diane Keaton) and dad Sam (John Goodman) are planning to split after 40 years of marriage. Their grown kids (Ed Helms and Olivia Wilde),

Charlotte's younger sister (Marissa Tomei) and her dad (Alan Arkin) all have issues of their own.

There's also a jaded waitress (Amanda Seyfried), a foul-mouthed urchin granddaughter (Blake Baumgartner), a cop with an identity crisis (Anthony Mackie), a couple of teens working out the sloppy, tongue-twisting kinks of French kissing, a say-anything septuagenarian aunt (June Squibb), and a strapping young soldier (Jake Lacy) who gets roped into the Christmas Eve family reunion as a pretend boyfriend.

And a partridge in a pear tree—no, not really. But it does get very, very crowded, and that's not even counting the narrator, who turns out to be... well, someone whose name you'll certainly recognize, in a form you'll in no way be expecting, in a manner that makes absolutely no sense at all.

Producer-director Jessie Nelson, whose previous projects include the heart-tugging, high-pedigree gloom of *I Am Sam*, *Stepmom* and *Corrina*, *Corrina*, remains true to form here, with an all-star cast fumbling around in a deep-dish holiday goo of dumb dialogue, silly shtick and artificial sweetness that feels like a concoction created with ingredients ladled from other, far better cinematic Christmas crock pots—a dollop of *It's a Wonderful Life*, splashes of *Love, Actually*, sprinkles of *National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation*.

Snow on snow on snow.

Ed Helms and Alan Arkin sing, a dog gets blamed for a fart he didn't make and Marissa Tomei hides a brooch in her mouth. There's mashed potato slinging, Christmas carol mangling, streets full of Santas, gingerbread men in G-string frosting, and a joyous, swirling dance to a Bob Dylan song.

And so much snow. But it never piles up—and like the movie, it never adds up, either, to anything more than a slushy, mushy holiday heap of ho-ho-hokum.
