### Hor Topics 3/7 Marine to receive Medal of Honor, first since Vietnam

OUANTICO, Va. - A corporal who died shielding men in his care from a bursting grenade deserves America's highest military decoration, President George W. Bush has confirmed.

Actions by Cpl. Jason L. Dunham, who would have turned 25 Nov. 10, merit the Medal of Honor, Bush said at the National Museum of the Marine Corps' dedication ceremony, which coincided with the 231st Marine Corps. anniversary.

"And on this special birthday, in the company of his fellow Marines, I'm proud to announce that our nation will recognize Corporal Jason Dunham's action with America's highest decoration for valor, the Medal of Honor," Bush said in front of approximately 15,000 people.

The announcement prompted a booming "Ooh-rah!" - a spirited cry among Marines from the back of the crowd, and a long applause followed.

On April 14, 2004, in Iraq corporal used his helmet and his body to smother an exploding Mills Bomb let loose by a raging insurgent whom Dunham and two other Marines tried to subdue.

the lives of two of his men and showed the world what it means to be a Marine," said Bush.

Dunham lay face down with a shard the size of a dressshirt button lodged in his head. The hard, molded mesh that was his Kevlar helmet was now scattered yards around into clods and shredded fabric. Dunham never regained consciousness and died eight days later at the National Naval Medical Center in Bethesda, Md., with his mother and father at his bedside.

Dunham's commanding officers from 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines, investigated his actions and nominated him for the Medal of Honor. After two years and seven months making its way to the White House, the nomination now has the necessary approval from the president. The president will present the medal and citation at a date to be determined.

Hoping the president would make the Medal of Honor announcement on their son's birthday, Dan and Debra Dunham drove to near the Syrian border, the , Quantico from their home in-Scio, N.Y. Dunham is buried in Scio.

"The public now knows what Jason did." said Deb. "We still have a loss, but the gift that lason gave helps us go on. The good part is that we get to make new memories and bring new people into the family; the bad news is there will be no new memories with Jason."

The president acknowledged Dan and Deb sitting in the front row. The parents held each other close as the audience gave a resounding applause.

'We took (the applause) as a thank you for us, but it was for Jason," Deb said. "At that point, Dan and I were missing Jason a lot."

Addressing Dunham's parents, Bush said, "We remember that the Marine who so freely gave his life was your beloved son. We ask a loving God to comfort you for a loss that can never be replaced.

"As long as we have Marines like Corporal Dunham, America will never fear for her liberty."

Before Dunham, the last Marine actions to earn the medal happened May 8, 1970, in Vietnam, according to Marine Corps History Division records. A Medal of Honor citation details Lance Cpl. Miguel Keith's machinegun charge that inspired a platoon facing

has given America to show her sympathy with peace in justice in the councils of the nation."

While active duty military members, veterans and civilians celebrated Veterans Day all over the country, Marines from the Combat Center got a chance to celebrate it at the parade with local veterans and felnearly overwhelming odds: Wounded, Keith ran into "fire-swept terrain." Wounded again by a grenade, he still attacked, taking out enemies in the forward rush. Keith fought until mortally wounded; his platoon came out on top despite being heavily outnumbered.

The last Marine to receive the Medal of Honor was Maj. Gen. James L. Day, who distinguished himself as a corporal in the Battle of Okinawa in 1945. On Jan. 20, 1998, more than half a century later, President Bill Clinton presented the medal to Day, who passed away that year.

Since the Long War began, the president has presented one Medal of Honor. On April 4, 2003, during Operation Iraqi Freedom, Army Sgt. 1st Class Paul R. Smith posthumously earned the medal for organizing a defense that held off a company-sized attack on more than 100 vulnerable coalition soldiers. In the defense, Smith manned a .50 caliber machine gun in an exposed position until he was mortally wounded.

### Wounded Houston Marine turns down option to return to U.S., stays in Iraq

AL QA'IM, Iraq – Cpl. Shayne C. Lameyer didn't want to go home after being wounded by a roadside bomb in Iraq's Al Anbar Province. He couldn't bear to leave his fellow Marines in a combat zone while he was home safe and sound.

The 21-year-old Marine rifleman and Houston native spent weeks recuperating in a U.S. military medical facility from the shrapnel wounds he sustained in his right shoulder from the bomb's blast. That was nearly two months ago.

He could have returned to the United States to recuperate, but instead chose to remain in Iraq, refusing to leave his fellow Marines. He wouldn't have it any other way, he said.

"The only reason why I am here is for my brothers – plain and simple," said Lameyer, a squad leader with battalion's Kilo Company, which operates in Husaybah, a border town of about 50,000 along the Euphrates River.

Now, he's back to daily patrols with his unit – the Twentynine Palms, Calif.based 3rd Battalion, 4th

Marine Regiment. The battalion arrived in Iraq about two months ago and provides security sideby-side with Iraqi Security Forces to the dozens of cities and towns in this region just east of the Iraq-Syria border.

A few days after the incident, while recovering in Al Qa'im, Lameyer asked his battalion commander, Lt. Col. Scott C. Shuster, if he could return to duty.

"He told me not to worry, that I'll be back with my boys," said Lameyer.

Kilo Company's senior enlisted Marine, 1st Sgt. Robert M. Sands, says Lameyer is a "true warrior" for wanting to stay in Iraq.

"He still wanted to stay in the fight," said Sands. "Not too many people would do that."

After three weeks of recovering in Al Qa'im, Lameyer, who is described by a fellow Marine as "quiet and productive," was granted his request.

"I don't think it's fair that I go home," said Lameyer. "The guys that didn't get hit by the blast still have to be here, and if they have to be here, then I'll be here."

Although he had the choice to go back to the United States to heal and rehabilitate, his return to his unit did

not come as a surprise to his fellow Marines.

"When we heard he wanted to come back we were all excited," said Lance Cpl. Thomas E. Bergh, a 19-yearold Marine from Las Vegas. "It motivated us."

Sands said he was "hurt and angry" when he heard over the radio what had happened to Lameyer that night. As the company's senior enlisted, Sands wants to make sure all of his Marines and sailors get through the deployment safe and sound, he said.

"That's someone's son or husband," said Sands, a Baltimore native who is serving his second combat tour in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. "I am happy that [Lameyer] was able to recover and return to us. That Marine wanted no sympathy."

Looking back on the night of the incident, Lameyer says he's glad he was fortunate enough to heal as he did and thinks often about another Marine who was injured in the improvised explosive device attack.

"It was tough being away from my guys," said Lameyer. "I know he misses the squad. 1 understand how tough it could be being away from the guys you train and work with."

Since his return to duty, Lameyer has worked on regaining strength in his right shoulder. His objective is to carry his rifle and wear his combat load – a flak vest with bullet resistant plates inserted, helmet, and full ammunition load – without having any complications, he said. But his overall focus is to patrol alongside his fellow Marines so they can return safely home.

"They are definitely a good group of guys," said Lameyer. "I trained with them, lived with them, know their strengths, know their weaknesses – I know I can trust them."

### 3/4 Marines celebrate Corps' birthday in Iraq

AL QA'IM, Iraq — Twohundred thirty-one years of world-wide service and battlefield victories were honored by the U.S. Marines of Task Force 3rd Battalion, 4th Marine Regiment, as they celebrated the Marine Corps birthday in this region of Iraq's Al Anbar Province, Nov. 10. The battalion, based out of Twentynine Palms, Calif., is on its fourth deployment in Iraq since 2003. The battalion provides security to the region - a series of towns and cities along the Euphrates River, just miles east of the

Iraq-Syria border. The Marines conduct daily patrols with Iraqi Security Forces here, quelling insurgent activity and assisting local governments and lraqi Security Forces to provide their own security, eventually allowing Coalition Forces to leave.

"This is a very important Marine Corps birthday for us because we are celebrating it during a time of war in a combat zone," said Sgt. Benjamin S. Sundell, a Murrieta, Calif., native who has deployed four times to Iraq with the battalion. This was the battalion's

first year of celebrating the Marine Corps' birthday in Iraq - a celebration that will be memorable to many of the Marines here.

"Today we are celebrating our traditions that have shaped the Marine Corps into what it is today in a foreign land where the Marine Corps belongs," said Sundell.

The first celebration of the Marine Corps' birthday was in 1921 when then Commandant Gen. John A. Lejeune, directed that "a reminder of the honorable service of the Corps be published by every command" on Nov. 10 of every year.

In regard to Lejeune's order, the Marines here took time away from combat operations to commemorate the Corps' history.

Ist Lt. James E. Peoples, a native of Salinas. Kan., and battalion adjutant, read the birthday message from the 33rd commandant of the Marine Corps, Gen. Michael W. Hagee.

"This year's celebration again finds many from our ranks serving with distinction in harm's way," read Peoples from the commandant's message, "As we have for the past 231 years, our Corps is answering the Nation's call."

"To all who have earned the title Marine, to the superb sailors who serve with us in every clime and place, and to our precious families - I wish each one of you a heartfelt happy 231st birthday," ended Hagee's message. "Semper Fidelis and keep attacking."

Lt. Col. Scott C. Shuster, battalion commander, told the Marines that the birthday is a "time to reflect on the accomplishments and sacrifices of the past," but also a time to think of the future.

"Let us never forget those who have gone before us, and let their courage strengthen our resolve," said Shuster. "The members of this task force will have a celebration that they will remember for the rest of their lives. It is also

an opportunity to commit ourselves to our nation and our Corps for the future."

During the ceremony. Shuster cut the cake, and gave the first piece to the oldest Marine present. The oldest Marine present then passed a piece to the youngest Marines present. "symbolizing the experience and the youthful spirit that are hallmarks of the Corps."

The first piece of cake went to Sgt. Maj. Mark M. Geletko. battalion sergeant major. Geletko says he's celebrated the birthday all over the world, but celebrating it in a combat zone is especially significant to him.

"It's important to keep the sacred tradition alive," said Geletko, a Pittsburgh, Pa., native. "It's an honor taking the first piece of the cake."

Geletko then passed the next piece of cake to the youngest Marine present, Lance Cpl. Ramon A. Perez, an 18-year-old Marine from Newark, NJ. He said the distinction of being the youngest Marine present was an honor,

"I will never forget this, especially because I celebrated the birthday in Iraq," said Perez, a detention facility sentry with the Philadelphiabased 3rd Battalion, 14th Marine Regiment.

As the ceremony ended.

the evening in the northwestern Iraqi desert grew frigid, a harbinger of the bitter winter yet to come for the deployed service members. The clear sky emitted moonlight upon the men of Task Force 3/4 who socialized for a moment as the celebration came to an end.

Throughout the night, combat operations still carried on in the region, and the Marines continued their tradition as a force that is "first to fight."

In a country where terrorists struggle to make a stand, the Marines here are continuing the very 231 years of faithful service they celebrated just hours earlier - patrols throughout the region with Iraqi soldiers and police, always on the lookout for insurgent activity.

The battalion, nicknamed "Shanghai" for its history of assigned garrison duty in Shanghai, China, in 1924, participated in the initial push to Baghdad in 2003. The Marines redeployed to Iraq's Al Anbar Province in 2004, where they spent six months in Haditha, Iraq. They also participated in major combat operations in Fallujah on their third deployment, and have provided security in the Al Qa'im region for nearly two months now.

### Bush calls Saddam Hussein verdict 'milestone,' thanks U.S. service members

WASHINGTON – Without the help of American service members, the Nov. 5 verdict against Saddam Hussein would not have been possible, the commander in chief said in Waco, Texas.

President Bush called the trial "a milestone" in Iraq's efforts to replace the rule of a tyrant with the rule of law. Today's verdict, he said, represents a major achievement for Iraq's young democracy and its constitutional government.

The Iraqi High Tribunal found Saddam guilty in his actions against the citizens of Dujail, Iraq. and sentenced him to death by hanging.

In the 1982 incident, Saddam ordered the military, Baath Party loyalists and interior department police to arrest, detain and torture men, women and children in the town.

Although the Dujail case was the first against the former dictator to go to trial, he is also charged with genocide against the Kurds in the northern part of Iraq in the 1980s.

Bush emphasized the fairness of the trial and the irony that Saddam received protections that he denied the Iraqi people under his rule. "During the Saddam Hussein trial, the court received evidence from 130 witnesses," Bush said. "The man who once struck fear into the hearts of Iraqis had to listen while free Iraqis recounted the acts of torture and murder that he ordered against their families and against them."

"Today," the president said, "the victims of this regime have received a measure of the justice that many thought would never come."

The former dictator will have an automatic right to appeal his sentence. "He will continue to receive the legal rights and due process that he denied to the Iraqi people," the president said. "Iraq has a lot of work ahead as it builds its society that delivers equal justice and protects all its citizens. Yet history will record today's judgment as an important achievement on the path to a free and just and unified society."

The United States will continue to stand with Iraq's unity government, Bush said. He praised the courage and determination of the Iraqi security forces.

The president thanked the men and women of the U.S. military for their sacrifices to free Iraq and defend America. "Without their courage and skill, today's verdict would not have happened," he said. "On behalf of the American people, I thank every American who wears the uniform. I thank their families and I thank them for their service and their sacrifice."

### EOD technicians clear the ranges of potential hazards

Through the hills and rocky terrain of Range 400, the Marines of Explosive Ordnance Disposal walked and scanned the area, clearing it of all ordnance that could pose a threat to units currently training.

"The purposes of the sweeps are to keep ordnance and explosive residue to a minimum. and to allow the newer, better targets to be put in for the Marines to train," said Master Sgt. Michael Burghardt, EOD liaison for Tactical Training and Exercise Control Group. "It also provides training for EOD technicians on ordnance identification and fragmentation identification, which helps them when deploying to foreign countries."

When conducting a range sweep a range safety officer, officer-in-charge, Navy corpsman and EOD technicians are present. The current sweep includes 14 Marines, some of which are with east coast units, but are currently training at Mojave Viper.

"A range sweep, consists of going out and searching for unexploded ordnance or dud ordnance that has been fired by the mortars or assault men," said Sgt. Bryce Cannon, EOD technician and Range Safety Officer for the Range 400 sweep, "Basically, we go out and clear the ranges of hazards that are just lying out there."

EOD technicians perform range sweeps depending on the training that is being conducted and how often units are being pushed through the different ranges.

"We end up doing range sweeps every other week, with some ranges more than others." said Cannon. "We clear Range 400 after Mojave Viper usually, because every unit goes to that range during training."

The EOD technicians went out to recover various ordnance used by the different infantry units. They were sweeping the range for 81 millimeter and 60 millimeter high explosive mortars, 60 millimeter white phosphorus or red phosphorus, illumination rounds that didn't go off, smoke grenades, artillery simulators, anti-personnel obstacle breaching systems, shoulder-launched multi-purpose assault weapons and AT-4 anti-armor weapons

"We recovered 15, 60mm mortars, four SMAW: five, AT-4: 49, 81mm; 15, 40mm practice grenades: 5, APOBS: 150, 5.56 rounds: and one artillery simulator," said Cannon.

The range sweeps, which take a majority of the day, pay off in the end in various ways to the different Marines involved.

"My favorite part of the range sweep is you get a chance to know your Marines," said Burghardt, "With such a busy schedule, especially here at Twentynine Palms between Mojave Viper, VIP visits, deploying Marines to augment other forces going to Iraq and Afghanistan, sometimes you don't get a chance to get a one-on-one with your Marines to understand what kind of level of experience they have. Are they gaining experience or are they just at idle? It's a chance to chat with them about just life in general, and you don't get that chance here in the shop."

For Cannon, the best part of the sweep is the final result.

"We stack all the ordnance, place C4 on top of it, and blow it up," said Cannon. "That's the best part of the range sweep, blowing it up."

While the EOD technicians conduct operations here on base, they continuously gain more knowledge and experience in their job field that can help them while overseas. Their job field deals with an immense amount of ordnance that they must know how to identify, handle and dispose of, Range sweeps also give EOD technicians a chance to further their knowledge.

#### Supply keeps Marines ready, training rolling

Without them, training would cease to exist. Without them, the crucial supplies needed for units to continue training would sit unordered, dusty and unused in a warehouse. Marines would not have access to the needed gear that could save their lives all the way down to the simple necessities, such as toilet paper, if it wasn't for the Marines in the supply military occupation specialty.

Supply Marines' days are filled with a variety of obligations to ensure everything is accounted for and issued to the units.

"A day in supply consists of the management, transport, delivery and or pick-up of gear for every training unit on Camp Wilson, along with the support detachments," said Cpl. Lawrence Shadden, supply administrative clerk. "We work from 7 a.m. to 1700 [5 p.m.] every day, to include the weekends."

Supply is responsible for a variety of items from chemical lights and pens to small arms protective inserts and humvee batteries. They keep the Marine Corps up to date on issued gear and are constantly dealing with the returning and issuing of gear. At Camp Wilson, with five battalions currently on deck, supply is staying busy.

"The hard part right now is keeping up with the demand and making sure everyone is getting what they need," said Shadden. "We are incredibly busy right now."

The supply Marines at Camp Wilson are always on call and along with ordering, stocking and issuing supplies, are in charge of the monetary accounts as well.

Many have strong feelings on what supply means to the Marine Corps.

"The Marine Corps without supply would be a bunch of guys standing around waiting to kill something but without any guns to do if with, said Shadden. "We are the heart of the unit, we pump out all the materials that are needed." Camp Wilson supply chief, Staff Sgt. Bryan Tellez agrees that supply is a central part to the operation of the Marine Corps. "I would say supply itself is the lungs of the Corps," said Tellez. "We branch out to so many people, without us, units would not be able to function. Units come out and we're their vital support. If we fail them, it could stop all training. So we do their bidding, whatever they need we get for them." While at times the demand and rush of things at Camp Wilson gets stressful, Marines still feel success when the job is completed and training is running smoothly.

While Marines continue to fight overseas and to train stateside, support units will continue to help the cause, providing Marines the essentials for training.

As long as Marines are in the fight, there will be those Marines in the fight right beside them, guiding them and ensuring they are set up for success.

### FASP helps Mojave Viper units maintain combat readiness

What's a Marine without a rifle, and what's a rifle without ammunition? Engaging an enemy with an empty barrel is pointless. Without a supply , of ammunition, Marines would no longer be able to fight the fight.

Marines at Field Ammo Supply Point keep the units training with Mojave Viper supplied with all the ammothey need to continue their training. They are responsible for making sure the correct ammo is received and a correct inventory is kept.

"We have three basic sections at the Field Ammunition Supply Point," said Gunnery Sgt. David Hostuttler, officer in charge. "Records, which controls all documentation for the ammunition received and issued making sure we have the correct amount. Issues, which is the face of FASP, is with whom the training units conduct issues and turn-ins. Finally, the storage section, who is responsible for ensuring all ammunition is stored safely and is ready to be issued out."

The Marines at the FASP. approximately three miles past Camp Wilson, are tasked with a job that requires long hours, 14 to 16 hour days, seven-days-a-week. They are responsible for the tracking and managing of millions of rounds of ammo, which are priced in the millions.

around "We store 750,000 short tons of ammo here, and issue about eight to 12, seven tons a day," said Lance Cpl. Ricky Hopper, records, "Last year, we issued out \$83 million worth of ammo from small arms to high explosive mortars."

Recently, the FASP received four more ammo technicians because there were six battalions on deck. giving all support units increased workloads, and

manned at all times," said Hostuttler. "We are here to support all units and conduct operations 24/7. When there were six battalions on deck, we were working 14 to 16 hour days. seven-days-a-week."

Ammo technicians take great pride in knowing their job is crucial for the Marine Corps to continue training.

"The infantry is getting . ammo from us to maintain and sustain combat readiness skills to better sustain the fight," said Sgt. lan Tunnell, operations chief.

Cpl. James Clark, records chief, agrees with the importance of his job, "If you don't have a bullet to put in your gun, you have nothing, it's that simple."

The Marines who work at the FASP are here on temporary duty assignment orders from east coast units, and are working with more ammo than usual.

'Mojave Viper is intense as far as ammunition usage goes," said Hostuttler. "There is a lot of ammo distributed here. When it comes to accountability and serviceability of the rounds, we are responsible. We deal with all the ammo issued, and the ammo received, to also include returned unserviceable ammo."

Behind concertina wire. the ammo techs at the FASP prepare ammo and check returned ammo, making sure it is still in good condition and can be reissued to other training units. They also deal with unserviceable ammo and request disposition to either destroy it or get it shipped out.

Knowing the power behind ammunition, the technicians keep constant accountability. Just like any other support unit,"it is vital they know their job.

"This was an unbelievable experience, I was impressed with the longevity of the mammals and how well they were trained," said Lieutenant Colonel Mike Pagano, Marine Aircraft Group 46, S-1 Officer and CH-53E pilot. when describing his dolphin transport mission in support of the U.S. Navy Marine Mammal Program.

The NMMP primarily uses bottlenose dolphins and California sea lions for underwater sentry duty, mine clearance, and object recovery because of their sensory and diving capabilities. In addition, the Navy is

Dolphins naturally possess a sophisticated sonar system. Their sonar can accurately detect potentially dangerous objects while operating in challenging environments such as deep. murky, or dark water.

Sea lions have excellent low light vision, underwater directional hearing, can maneuver in tight spaces and can go onto shore if necessary.

According to Pagano when transporting the mammals, veterinarians, technicians and other support personnel saw to the mammal's comfort using a combination of food, padding, ice, and water,

In addition, a portable veterinary clinic accompanied

trips, the animals would have been transported in Naval vessels or in airplanes.

In April 1980, the Veterinary Corps Branch of the U.S. Army was appointed as the Department of Defense executive agent for veterinary services and one detachment is assigned to the NMMP. Corpsmen and veterinary technicians also provided direct veterinary support.

Dolphins have an average life span of 25 years, however, the average dolphin in the NMMP lives 35 to 40 years. The dolphins generally start their training at 10 years old but may begin training several years earlier. It takes 7 to 15 years of training before the dolphins become operamature the difficulty of their missions can increase, according to Pagano.

Animals have always played a prominent role in the world's militaries. Homing pigeons were used to carry messages during the French Revolution and as late as World War I.

Horses, camels and elephants have been used as mounts throughout recorded history. The elephant even saw action as late as World War II because of its ability to work in locations that were inaccessible to vehicles.

Dogs have been a mainstay in the armed forces and while some of their missions have changed, they continue to serve important roles in the modern military.

### Naval hospital emergency room procedures explained

The Naval Hospital Twenty Nine Palms Emergency Room can be a confusing and sometimes frustrating place to receive healthcare. Our staff will do everything we can to help answer any questions that you may have during your visit to our service.

We must prioritize patients so that the critical and life threatening illnesses are treated first. This may mean that less serious illnesses may not be seen in the order that they come in to the ER. We try very hard to keep the waiting time to a minimum, but wait time may vary with the number of patients and the severity of the illnesses that are currently being treated.

If you find that you need to bring yourself or .a family member to our emergency service, here are some things that you can do that may improve your visit. Bring a list of medications and correct doses. If you don't know these, then bring the medications in with you. Be sure to let the triage

significant medical problems that you may have. Have someone available to drive you home. Sometimes we give medications that don't allow you to drive.

Every patient is important to us! Every patient will receive attention as quickly as we can provide it. Our busiest times are evening hours, on weekends and holidays. To help you through your visit to the ER, here is an example of a typical visit: Check in at the ER Registration Desk. First and foremost we provide patient privacy at all times. If standing in line to check in, please allow the person in front of you privacy. The medical clerk will create a chart to document your visit. You will be asked why you are here and current address, phone and insurance information.

#### Emergency Room Procedures Explained

The triage nurse is the first health professional you will see. He or she will need descriptions of your illness. medications and allergies. Patients waiting for treatment will be prioritized by need severity of symptoms and condition on presentation. The triage nurse can provide first aid supplies, such as Tylenol, Motrin, bandages, splints or ice packs if needed. Your blood pressure and temperature will be recorded at this time. You may be asked to provide a urine sample, visit. radiology for x-ray imaging, or have a blood sample drawn

nurse know of any allergies or during this phase of your visit. Following this initial evaluation of your injury or illness, you will be directed to the appropriate waiting area.

> The hospital's ER will try to minimize the time spent in the waiting area. Your comfort, while waiting, is important to us. We ask that you refrain from eating or drinking while awaiting treatment. Those accompanying you are welcome to use the hospital's snack area, located on the first floor, Oceanside. If you wish to inquire about the status of a

patient, please use the beige wall phone in the waiting area. This telephone rings at the nursing station. The staff will be happy to provide you updated information.

As soon as possible, you will be called and taken to a room in the ER for an appropriate evaluation and treatment of your problem.

A healthcare provider will perform a physical examination. If injury or illness requires a specialist. one will be consulted to aid in your evaluation. The ER

at times can be very busy and crowded. We ask that only one support person accompany patients to help protect privacy.

If your problem does not require hospital admission, you will be discharged from the ER. Written instructions detailing home care procedures will be explained by a health care professional and given to you. Please do not hesitate to ask questions regarding your concerns. At, or before discharge you may receive a follow-up referral

or prescription for medication. Appropriate actions to facilitate either will be explained by a health care professional. The hospital's pharmacy is located on the first floor, across form the Radiology department.
