Southern California Edison has notified the base of a power outage starting the evening of Monday, Jan. 16, until the morning of Tuesday, Jan. 10.

Base power outage Monday

The base will begin to systematically shut down power at 5 p.m. Monday. Power is expected to be back up by 6:30 a.m. Tuesday. During the outage, portions of the installation will receive power from the Co-Generation Plant.

The goal is to maintain power to all BEQs and housing units, community services buildings and emergency essential facilities.

If power requirements cannot be lowered enough, additional buildings,

including sections of housing, may lose power also.

All units and personnel are required to shut down all non-essential equipment

and watch water usage during this time. If additional information is needed, please call the Public Works Officer 830-

6654 or Utilities and Energy Management at 830-5128. If you want to make sure that you can report an emergency during a power outage, you need to have a phone that plugs directly into a wall outlet and does

not rely on an electrical outlet to operate. The fastest and most direct way to report emergencies from your cell phone is by calling one of the 24-hour dedicated emergency lines at 830-3333 or 830-3334. Take the time to prepare. Program your cell phone when your hands aren't

shaking from the excitement of a true emergency.

he Combat Center's vast desert landscape is the final stop for Marines around the world preparing for war. The installation's 932 square miles house firing ranges and mock towns where troops get hands-on experience with the situations they are likely to face when forward deployed to a combat zone.

Year 2011 marked the opening of Range 220, known as the Combined Arms Military Operations in Urban Terrain. CAMOUT features more than 1,500 buildings and is the size of downtown San Diego. It features seven districts, each providing different urban challenges, 1,866 feet of tunnels and a fully-furnished 22,000-square-foot grand hotel. The facility is populated by role players acting as villagers, insurgents and fellow friendly forces. Many of them are native to Middle Eastern countries and well-versed in the language and customs of the areas troops are currently deployed.

- > When I was growing up, I was more intellectual. I didn't play sports. I played baseball, but that wasn't my fault.
- > A lot of Marines played football or wrestling, but not me.
- > I'm kind of a nerd, I guess.
- > When I was 8, we were at Yellowstone,
- and I got this scar from a bear. Then a ranger jumped out of nowhere. Not like an Army Ranger, but a real ranger. You know, a park ranger. And stopped it. It was crazv. But I'm OK.

> My family is mostly Indian. Not the Mohawk kind, but the kind with the red

- dot on forehead. > I left home when I was 19. I had started to work. I went to a community college. I got fed up with it. I needed a change.
- > The Marines looked good in their uniforms. They actually had equipment to work out on in their office. It was clean. They just had their stuff together.
- > It's just a different world within a world. You have the Marine Corps, then inside, there's the infantry. > Everyone has this image that all Marines are crazy, all Marines want to fight. That's just not true.
- > I see a Marine, I see a guy kicking down a door.

- > I enjoyed the fact of the freedom of mentality. I wasn't worried about my family. I wasn't worried about my payments. My car. All you do is patrol, eat, talk to your friends about what you're going to do when you get home. It's
