Through OHF's partnerships with dollar tree and the National Charity League, military service members are able to continue to gain assistance and provide holiday joy for their families annually.

"There's a lot of Marines out there who don't have the opportunity to come to these events," said Sgt. Jorge Altamiranosoto, motor vehicle operator, 1st Tank Battalion. "It's mainly to help the junior marines, and even ourselves. Getting something extra always helps and people shouldn't hesitate to come out here.'

3rd LAI Marines are home in time for holidays

"Daddy," a young girl squeals when she sees her father for the first time in a year. His wife leaps into his arms after their long separation; a family together again.

This was the sight when Marines from Company B, 3rd Light Armored Infantry Battalion (3rd LAI) returned to the Combat Center Thanksgiving Day from Camp Fuji, Japan after a year's deployment. Also Marines from Company D, returned from Camp Schwab on Okinawa Dec. 6. The remaining unit, Company C of the battalion will stay in Japan at Camp Schwab indefinitely.

The Marines were temporarily assigned to the 3rd Marine Expeditionary Force, on a one year unaccompanied tour, while Company A, reinforced, was the only company to remain at the Combat Center.

In Japan the battalion was able to train in a terrain much different than that of the Hi-Desert. They participated in a variety of maneuvers, and Company C participated in Team Spirit 89 this past spring.

"Every Marine should go overseas at least once." said Sgt. Edward Lemos, Company B. "It gives you a chance to see people and cultures that otherwise would have been impossible. Most of all, it makes you appreciate everything so much more."

Marines of Company B had been aboard the USS

33 34 Mount Vernon. They were completing paperwork and preparing their vehicles for debark. On board ship the Marines had opportunity to watch two English language television stations instead of the one that they had access to in Japan. Of course much of their time was spent thinking of the loved ones that they would soon be seeing.

A year ago, before the Marines left for Japan, their families attended a Family Readiness Program to help prepare them for their spouses' absence. While the Marines were in Japan, Charlene Burham, wife of Sgt. David Burham, Company A, was a point of contact for the wives here who might have had any problems, personal or financial while their husbands were away.

Most of the Marines will take 30 days leave during the holidays after their long separation from their families. Some will use this time to bring back spouses who stayed with relatives during their absence.

When the Marines return to their normal duties, they will have to re-adjust to the climate. Training will continue as the 3rd LAI Marines prepare for a field exercise they will participate in February.

SSgt. Keith Harris, Company B, said of his homecoming, "Japan is a great learning experience for any Marine, but it's great to be back in the States."

WHAT I'VE LEARNED

Grace HASLET, N.J. Financial analyst, Comptroller Directorate

> I've been in Twentynine Palms, [Calif.] since

> I was born in Brooklyn, N.Y., and raised in New Jersey. Before I came here, I worked for the Navy at Earle's Naval base in New Jersey and then I worked at an Army base in New Jersey before I came out here.

> My mom had five children and she was a single mom so we were raised on welfare. That's how I started in civil service. We were a low-income family and I had applied for the student aid program. That's when I started working for the different bases. When I finally passed that program, I was able to come into civil service without even taking the test.

> Growing up, I remember my mom was in charge of the Red Cross for the district. We used to help her go door-to-door and collect money.

> When I got here, I was only 19 years old. $\rm I$ just wanted to get away, so I applied for a job here over the phone. I drove from the east coast to the west coast. I got here on a Monday and I started work on Tuesday and I've been here ever since.

> It was my first time away from home and it was scary because I was only 19. When I got out here, there

> I stayed with a friend on base for a while and then I had to get my own apartment. I moved into this apartment with a set of dishes, my clothes and a TV.

> When I got here, I was working at the commissary for about three months. Then this job opened and I applied for it and received on the job training.

> I didn't have any prior experience in financial planning.

> I've worked in all different parts of the finance office. I started as a clerk and then I became an auditor and then I was in charge of military pay. I was [officerin-charge] for military pay for a long time, and then when they moved the finance office down to Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton, [Calif.] due to consolidation I was a [Defense Travel System] agent. I'm also a lead defense travel administrator for the base.

> I received the highest award a civilian can get working for civil service. I was taken aback, and I didn't

even know I was being looked at for that. My supervisor at the time recommended me.

> I like dealing with Marines. When I was OIC for military pay, I had 40 Marines that worked under me and I just loved working with them. In fact, I used to cook a lot of food and feed them all the time.

> I support the Marines because when they go [temporary assingment duty] we ensure they get the entitlements that they deserve and we ensure that they're paid correctly. When a Marine is paying off a debt of some sort they come to us and make that payment also.

> I'm on the Twentynine Palms community food pantry, and I hand food out twice a month there. I like to make sure that people are fed.

> Food is donated to us and we hand out food to people who need it, like people with low income or the homeless.

>I 've been involved with this for over 15 years. I got involved through my church. They had a pantry at the church, and I just started volunteering.

> I like to cook, and around Thanksgiving, I have people give me their leftover turkey carcass and I take that and make soup and give it to everybody.

> I love to ride motorcycles. My husband and I do a lot of different runs for different fundraisers.

> I started riding when I was in high school.

> I ride with a Christian group and I know God has his hand on me so I'm not afraid.

> We do runs with different groups that are more hardcore bikers and they accept us because they know we're Christians. They even come over and we pray with them sometimes.

> I love plants. I used to have over 60 house plants. I don't pay attention to the names, I just help them grow. I love to watch little leaves when they first start budding. When they're all rounded up and they unravel.

> I'm glad I came here because I've met a lot of people. I can honestly say that if I were to take a trip around the world I would have a home to stay in.

> If you were to open up my year book, under my photo where they write the descriptions, mine says 'work for the government'.

Lebda has 42 years of civil service. Her official retirement date is Jan. 1, which is also her birthday.



> I'm planning to stay home for a month. I

have some unfinished rooms in my house so I'm going to work on those. I also want to volunteer for Tender Loving Christmas in Yucca Valley, [Calif.] and look into Unity Home for battered women.

> It makes me feel good, I enjoy helping other people if it's a true need.

> I've been around Marines for so long. I know I'm going to miss working on base.

> I like it all, I can't pin point it. I like meeting people, I like meeting all kinds of people coming from all different places and just talking.

> I'm not afraid to walk up to anybody and start a conversation. I'm not afraid to ask questions because if I was shy, how would I do my job? Don't tell me I can't do anything, because I will. To me, that's like a challenge.

Palm Springs hosts 23rd ann

PALM SPRINGS, Calif., -As the sunlight faded over Palm Canyon drive, floats draped in holiday multi-colored lights began to move and the crowd of more than 60,000 spectators grew louder as each passed, spreading holiday cheer at the 23rd annual Festival of Lights Parade in Palm Springs, Calif., Saturday.







From Bad To Worse

Things go wrong in 'Horrible Bosses' sequel, in more ways than one

If you got a chuckle out of the first one, you'll probably get a chuckle out of this one. But just because you might doesn't mean you should. And why don't you save your titters for something that's not such a waste of talent, a lazy roll over retreaded gags, and a smutty stroll down a street full of racist, sexist and homophobic jokes?

The first Horrible Bosses, in 2011, set up an initially amusing, over-the-top, screwball comedy: Three hapless schmucks (Jason Bateman, Jason Sudeikis and Charlie Day), each so exasperated with their individual employment situations, were driven to an absurdly extreme measure: a plan to murder their bosses.

Their bosses were pretty bad—especially the crooked, conniving business owner (Kevin Spacey) and the rapacious sexual-predator dentist (Jennifer Anniston). Awful, yes-but sometimes awfully funny.

Both Spacey and Anniston, as well as the knucklehead trio of Bateman, Sudeikis and Day, are back in Bosses 2. This time, the disgruntled employees have become entrepreneurs—they're the bosses now-striking out on their own with a prototype for an all-in-one bathing accessory. But when an unscrupulous distributor (Chrisoph Waltz) hatches a ploy to bankrupt them and take over their operation, they devise their own plan for

payback—by kidnapping his insufferably spoiled adult son (Chris Pine) for ransom.

Things go "horribly" wrong, of course—in more ways than one. The plot follows the same basic course as the first movie, down to some of the same exact gags. (Hey, they got a laugh the first time, right?) The humor is beyond bawdy—it's super raunchy, and so blatantly offensive on so many levels, it almost seems admirable the filmmakers tried so hard to maintain such a consistent tone of tastelessness.

To call it "bathroom" humor demeans a lot of bathrooms, especially in one particular scene with a toothbrush, and in another when the discussion in a sexaholics support group turns to a topic that would be shocking even if it didn't involve underage children.

Any guffaws these jokes get depends on just how far you think it's OK to go for a laugh, and how closely you care to look at what you're really laughing at. I'm not sure in what context a reference to the sexual assault of a hospital patient in a coma, for instance, would come off as funny—but here it's played just that way.

Jamie Foxx returns as a shady career criminal whose obscenity of a nickname can't be printed in a newspaper but is repeated dozes of times in the movie, and whose flawed advice the would-be kidnappers once again seek.

The first time around, the bosses were terrible, but the movie wasn't so bad. This time, the "new" bosses turn out to be awful, too, the movie is a disappointment, and the jokes may make you laugh... but you should feel guilty about it when you do.
