# **2014 Medal of Honor recipient**

On June 19, 2014, President Barrack Obama presented Cpl. William Kyle Carpenter with the Medal of Honor for actions performed on Nov. 21, 2010 in Helmand province, Afghanistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. The Medal of Honor is the highest military honor presented to a service member for risk of life in combat beyond the call of duty. Carpenter became the eighth recipient and the third Marine alongside Cpl. Jason Dunham and Sgt. Dakota Meyer presented with the Medal for actions in Iraq or Afghanistan.

#### Citation

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty while serving as an Automatic Rifleman with Company F, 2d Battalion, 9th Marines, Regimental Combat Team 1, 1st Marine Division, Marine Expeditionary Force in Helmand Province, Afghanistan, in support of Operation Enduring Freedom on 21 November 2010. Lance Corporal Carpenter was a member of a platoon-sized coalition force, comprised of two reinforced Marine rifle squads partnered with an Afghan National Army squad. The platoon had established Patrol Base Dakota two days earlier in a small village in the Marjah District in order to disrupt enemy activity and provide security for the local Afghan population. Lance Corporal Carpenter and a fellow Marine were manning a rooftop security position on the perimeter of Patrol Base



Dakota when the enemy initiated a daylight attack with hand grenades, one of which landed inside their sandbagged position. Without hesitation and with complete disregard for his own safety, Lance Corporal Carpenter moved toward the grenade in an attempt to shield his fellow Marine from the deadly blast. When the grenade detonated, his body absorbed

the brunt of the blast, severely wounding him, but saving the life of his fellow Marine. By his undaunted courage, bold fighting spirit, and unwavering devotion to duty in the face of almost certain death, Lance Corporal Carpenter reflected great credit upon himself and upheld the highest traditions of the Marine Corps and the United States Naval Service.

# -CHANGES in the CORPS-

Throughout the 239 years of its existence, the Marine Corps has gone through many evolutions to become the force of rediness it is and 2014 was no exception. The Corps saw many changes last year that included a change in leadership with the new Commandant taking charge. Marines also saw a change in their mission upon leaving combat roles in Helmand province, Afghanistan. The Corps' saw various uniform changes for both male and female Marines. Units also changed with the deactivation of 1st Battalion, 9th Marine Regiment among others. No matter the change, the Marine Corps' mission to be America's tip of the spear remains the same.

New Commandant:

Gen. James F. Amos the 35th Commandant of the Marine Corps passed command to Gen. Joseph F. Dunford Jr. on Oct.17, 2014. Upon taking command Dunford said his focus for the coming years was to make sure that the Marine Corps remains the expeditionary force in readiness that the nation has come to expect.

Marines depart Helmand province:

After five years of combat operations in Helmand province, Afghanistan, U.S. Marines and British service members lowered the battle colors one last time aboard Camp Leatherneck on Oct. 26, 2014. Operational command of the base was handed off to the Afghan National Security Forces and all remaining elements of the Marine Expeditionary Brigade departed aboard C-17 fixed-wing aircraft on Oct. 27, 2014.

Sun's out guns out:

On March 9, 2014, Gen. James F. Amos announced the uniform change to have rolled sleeves with the desert utility uniform. Amos re-introduced the rolled sleeves to capture part of 'the soul of the Corps' that non-commissioned officers wanted back.

Deactivations:

1st Battalion, 9th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, also known as 'The Walking Dead' due to their high casualty rates during the Vietnam War, rolled their battle colors up for the last time aboard Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune Aug. 29, 2014. The year also saw the deactivation of Combat Center units to include 'Dark Horse,' 3rd Battalion, 4th Marines, 7th Marine Regiment, May 30, 2014 and 3rd Combat Engineer Battalion, Aug. 5, 2014.

The Ground Combat Element Integrated Task Force:

The GCEITF was created as part of the Marine Corps' Force Integration Plan to conduct integrated, gender-neutral training in the execution of both individual and collective training tasks within designated ground combat arms occupational specialties. The GCEITF is led by Col. Matthew G. St. Clair and Sgt. Maj. Robin C. Fortner. Their training began October 2014 aboard Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune, N.C. Upon completion of an intensive 16-week training schedule aboard Camp Lejeune, the unit is scheduled to deploy for further training in 2015.




a part of life, but quitting

shouldn't be."








# NGES

Marines have been fighting our nation's wars for more than 200 years. A Marine's fierce warfighting is rooted in the Corps' ability to prepare unit's for "any climb or place." It takes places like the Combat Center to facilitate the training and keep Marines at their best at all times. The Installation does training year-round to ensure the readiness of Marines for any combat situation they may encounter. The environment here tests every Marine with its harsh conditions and mountainous terrain. Units come to keep themselves one step ahead of the rest and conduct pre-deployment training. Units partake in vigorous Integrated Training Exercises that test the knowledge and capabilities of every member of the team from the commanding officers to the fire team leaders. The Combat Center is the only base of its kind in the Marine Corps and it continues to train Marines for any mission.



## Disney version of fairy-tale mash-up musical hits all the right notes

"Into the Woods" Starring Meryl Streep, James Cordon & Emily Blunt Directed by Rob Marshall PG

Composer Stephen Sondheim's award-winning 1987 Broadway intertwined tapestry of several Grimm fairy tales laced with decidedly grown-up themes, debuts on the big screen with an all-star castand enough Disney tweaking to make it marketable to younger audiences.

Sondheim's musical mash-up takes wellknown characters from "Little Red Riding Hood," "Jack in the Beanstalk," "Rapunzel" and "Cinderella," adds a few others, and puts them all on a woodland collision course of fate and fortune-and sometimes, alas, misfortune.

"Anything can happen in the woods,"

And it certainly does, as a kindly baker (James Cordon) and his wife (Emily Blunt) embark on a journey to find the magical ingredients that (Meryl Streep) that has prevented them from having a child.

Before they go, they send Little Red Riding Hood (Lilla Crawford) traipsing off with a basket of baked goods to see her granny. Soon enough, they come across Cinderella (Anna Kendrick) fleeing from an arduous prince (Chris Pine), and the young village peasant Jack (Daniel Huddlestone), whose trade of a beloved milk cow for some magic beans will come to have calamitous effects for everyone.

As anyone familiar with the musical knows, Sondheim's storyline and wonderfully clever, crafty songs work on multiple levels. They

This fractured fairy tale might get a bit grim, especially for overly sensitive little ones; it was never intended as a sweet-dreams bedtime story.
