# Commandant visits Combat Center

The 37th Commandant of the Marine Corps, Gen. Robert B. Neller, and Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps Ronald L. Green visited the Combat Center, Oct. 6.

Neller spoke to I Marine Expeditionary Force and Combat Center units about the future of the Corps at the base theater. He also gave advice to leaders.

"Be a fair leader, always be there for your Marines, and show them compassion," Neller said. "That Marine came to you for a reason, so be there for them. If you are not, you will lose them."

Neller succeeded 36th Commandant of the Marine Corps Gen. Joseph Dunford on Sept. 24. In the Message from the Commandant he released the same day, Neller said that all previous guidance is still in effect to sustain and continue to improve the Corps. Green shared the same sentiment and

explained to the Marines and sailors to always prepare and be prepared.

"We are a team that never goes into the locker room or the sidelines," Green said. "All of the other services, once they are done deploying somewhere, they come home, but not us. We have Special Purpose Marine Air Ground Task Forces, Marine Expeditionary Units and we guard every U.S. Embassy across the globe. We are never on the sideline."

In addition to improving the Corps physically and mentally, Neller spoke about the technology that the world is experiencing and the different kind of battle that we are facing in cyberspace.

"We are in a new age of technology," Neller said.

"Today you probably have more processing power in your smart phone than a main frame computer did 15 years ago."

Earlier at the Commanding General's Conference Room, Neller discussed the Marine Air Ground Task Force Training Program with Combat Center Commanding General,

# NREA receives DOD sustainability award



The Department of Defense awarded the Combat Center the 2015 Secretary of Defense Sustainability Award in the non-industrial installation category, at the Combat Center Commanding General's Conference Room, Oct. 1.

Members from Natural Resource and Environmental Affairs, and Public Works Department, joined Combat Center Commanding General Maj. Gen. Lewis A. Craparotta and Combat Center Chief of Staff Col. James F. Harp, in the official award ceremony. The DOD selected the Combat Center for the award March 23, 2015.

Achieving the award involved noteworthy accomplishments from Oct. 1, 2012, through Sept. 30, 2014. According to Lt. Col. Timothy Pochop, director, NREA, exceeding DOD goals included working with the Water Conservation Task Force and various organizations within the Combat Center's Qualified Recycling Program.

"We were able to achieve a 45 percent water intensity reduction since 2007," Pochop said. "As of this month, we achieved a 48 percent reduction in

solid waste diversion."

Pochop said NREA plans to continue education on water conservation while progressing in storm water treatment and reuse techniques.

"One of our next projects includes installing a wastewater treatment plant to save on evaporative loss and improve use of recycled water," Pochop said.

The Combat Center also installed additional solar photovoltaic systems to surpass DOD standards in energy reduction. Lt. Cmdr. James Stewart, public works officer, said installing an additional co-generation plant in 2014 increased self-sustainability.

"We now have about nine megawatts of energy installed through our PV systems," said Stewart.

Gary Morrissett, base energy manager, added, "We're up to the point where we generate over 90 percent of our own power."

This year, along with receiving the Secretary of Defense Sustainability Award, the Combat Center also received the Secretary of the Navy Environmental Award, which recognized the Combat Center for its efforts in environmental awareness efforts in natural resources and sustainability throughout 2014.

# **Small Arms Range**

In the last three years at Twentynine Palms, the school and personnel have tried to create an atmosphere found at no other rifle range.

There is no so-called harassment, just sound, constructive, safe schooling which has proved to be an excellent pattern to follow when you compare that at this range, requalifications are better than 90% on the M-1 Rifle, and around 88% with the .45 caliber automatic pistol.

There are very few men who are assigned to training on the rifle range who don't enjoy it, especially during the second week when the firing begins. However, there is a very necessary lesson learned in the first five days of "snapping in" on the school range.

First, you are only required to spend two weeks each year requalifying on small arms, and very rarely between transfers and T.A.D., do a high percentage of the men make it that often. Therefore, it is necessary to them to familiarize themselves with the weapons. This is where the school range personnel come in.

The mission of the school range is to teach proper positions and sling adjustments, proper sight alignment, breathing, trigger squeeze, care and cleaning of the rifle along with necessary lubrication during firing, and to instruct the men on Range Safety Regulations. The school instructors like to sum it up as Physical and Mental conditioning, directed toward the second week when they "live fire" the M-1 on the line.

Normally, the range personnel instruct around 200 men in each detail, with new details beginning each Monday morning on the school range.

The majority of the range personnel comprise the line coaches. On the line, there are a number of jobs which necessitate constant alertness. Unconsciously, the line coaches must eye the weapons to insure they are carried correctly and used correctly when loaded.

Although the rifle range comprises the bulk if the Small Arms Range personnel, there are other ranges included under the jurisdiction of the Small Arms Range.

Next in attendance to the rifle range is the pistol range which is located in the same area. The other ranges are the machine gun, hand grenade, rifle grenade, and 3.5 inch rocket ranges.

These ranges are primarily used during the summer months by Marine Corps Reservists while attending their two weeks of annual field training on the newly paved addition to Del

The Reservists also use the rifle range during June, July and August for their requalification firing; leaving it open to regulars only nine months of the year.

Something that the range personnel are hoping for, now that the new road has been completed, is the addition of water and electricity to the Rifle Range area.

Presently electricity is gas generated, and the water comes from water trailers. Although slightly warm, there is ample water in the trailers as long as the individual furnishes his canteen.

Aside from the regular firing details on the rifle range there are scheduled Intermural Matches between the units assigned here. During these matches the "D" target is used for rapid fire, and the 600 yard line is utilized in place of the 500 yard line.

One of the highlights of the 1960 match season was the First Annual Masters International Hi-Desert High power Rifle Match. This was held here in February after the completion of the newly constructed 600 and 1000 yard lines, when some of the 240 military and civilian shooters participated in the match lasting four days.



# Love & Work

De Niro, Hathaway put mature 'seasoning' on workplace rom-com

"The Intern" Starring Robert De Niro & Anne Hathaway Directed by Nancy Meyers Rated PG-13

"Love and work, work and love, that's all there is," says Ben (Robert De Niro), paraphrasing Sigmund Freud in the opening moments of The Intern.

Ben's a 70-year-old retiree, adrift in Brooklyn after the death of his wife of 40-some years. He longs for purpose and connection that Mandarin Chinese lessons, tai chi in the park and morning treks to Starbucks can't provide. When he sees an ad for a "Senior Intern Program" at a hip new e-commerce clothing company, he thinks it could be just the thing to bring his decades of experience, loyalty and passion for productivity back into play.

After a humorous round of interviews with the start-up company's young "talent acquisition" team, Ben gets the job, assigned directly to the busy-bee founder and president, Jules (Anne Hathaway), a mile-a-minute micromanager who barely has time to even notice him.

How long will it take for the geriatric guru to go from invisible to indispensible?

Writer-director Nancy Meyers is best known for the frisky romantic comedies Something's Gotta Give, It's Complicated and The Parent Trap. There's both romance and comedy in The Intern—there's no mistaking the soft, rounded

edges of Meyers' humor and the sunny storybook optimism of her feel-good style. But still, it's not what you might think.

Ben doesn't fall—at least romantically—for Jules. They both grow ever closer in their relationship, and even end up literally "in bed" together, but it's all business, building a genuine friendship.

De Niro, a double Oscar winner, is well known for playing tough, so it's always great fun to see him working whimsical. But shades of some of his former, heavier performances are always around, lurking—Ben has a "mirror" moment that might be seen a silent spoof of "You talkin' to me?!" from Taxi Driver, and a comedic house break-in feels like it might morph into Goodfellas parody, if only there were a body in the trunk and a walk-on by Joe Pesci.

Hathaway, 32, another Oscar winner, plays Jules with sensitivity for her character's strengths as well as her struggles—which include a frazzled home life with her husband (Anders Holm, from TV's Workaholics) and their precocious young daughter (JoJo Kushner), and conflict about how her company has grown so much it may need to bring in a CEO, someone above her, to run things.

Renee Russo plays a frisky "older" staff masseuse who rubs Ben the right way, and three younger interns (Jason Orley, Zach Pearlman and Adam DeVine, also from Workaholics, as well as the Pitch Perfect movies) form male bonds with their much older, more stylish, infinitely wiser coworker.

The Intern won't win any awards. But for some hearty laughs and touching cross-generational life lessons from a couple of "old pros," it'll make for a decent date night, especially with audiences who often search in vain for movies of any kind—particularly comedies—seasoned for more "mature" tastes.
