Redeye Fired Before 500 viewers at MCB

A Redeve missile shoot, the final exam for the graduating gunners of the Redeye School, was witnessed by BrigGen Regan Fuller, a representative delegation from MCAS, El Toro, 350 civilians forn General Dynamics, a motion picture team from Camp Pendleton, civilian photogaphers, and a detachment of California Cadets, in the field at Marine Corps Base, 29 palms, on Thursday, Nov. 3.

Firing the Redeye, a shoulder mounted fired anti-aircraft missile, was the last phase in the intense three-week training schedule for prospective gunners. Twenty-three men were attempting to qualify with the deadly little weapon during the shoot. Their targets were special target drones guided by remote control by Navy personnel.

Gunnery Sergeant Tom Allen, NCOIC of the Redeye Gunner School, describes the test that the men fired as, "a very difficult course. We're training men as combat gunners, and it does it doesn't pay to baby a man. The Redeve is a very positive and effective weapon; before we say that a man can use it, he must prove himself with it under combat conditions."

As each target drone became airborne, tree gunners who were standing by, grabbed their weapons and raced for the firing areas. The three Marines sighted in on their target... the command, "Fire at will" came, and they released their missiles. The drones were blasted out of the air.

Redeye is a small weapon, as weapons go: it looks like a miniature rocket launcher. But considering the fact that the little heat-seeking explosive device can knock any aircraft out of the sky, is has a very large potential, indeed. It weighs under thirty pounds, it can be carried into any terrain, and it is operated by only one man.

Max Golden, Vice President of General Dynamics, and people from that organization came to view

the firing of the weapon which they make. Many of the men brought their wives and enjoyed the coffee and cake served. They learned many things about the Navy drones when the Marines (instructors from the Redeye School) gave detailed talks about the shoot.

Officers and men from El Toro represented virtually every unit stationed at the Marine Corps Air Station. LtCol W.L. Breach, Operations Officer of Marine Wing Service Group-37, and senior man of the part said, "we brought every man who was free here. We can learn something from this shoot... that Marines on the ground can give support to those in the air. It isn't always the other way around."

LtCol D.E. Erway, Commanding Officer of MARMTD and officer in charge of the shoot, described the operation to visiting Marine and Army observers, as well as a detachment of California Cadets, a boys' military club, is made up of schoolboys from 7th thru 12th grade and commanded by Paul Cross. Since he is a retired Marine Maser Gunner Sergeant and a reserve Captain in the National Guard, Crodd has plenty of experience with which to "break in" his troops.

Heading the six-man team of cameraman and other movie specialists from Camp Pendleton, 1st Lt D. Mosley had a special assignment during the shoot: cover the operations and make a movie about Redeye. His men made films of the drones in flight, the missiles firing and the hits scored. They shot from the top of their truck, in the gun pits and all over the range to complete their assignment.

All in all, Thursday, Nov. 3, was quite a day: the Redeye gunners proved themselves,, documentary movies were made, and a good number of civilians and service personnel learned about the Marine Corps operation of a deadly little missile: Redeye.







freedom we value so dearly. Today, we honor them by recognizing their service and contribution to our nation and our way of life. I am thankful that we have taken this opportunity to honor our veterans and remember their service."

Later in the day, as fanfare music and rhythmic beating drums played by a marching band echoed off the San Jacinto Mountains from Palm Canyon Drive, a sense of patriotism and pride was felt over the crowd of veterans, active-duty service members and civilians with the passing of the Combat Center Color Guard and military vehicles at the 19th annual Palm Springs Veterans Day Parade in Palms Springs, Calif.

The Combat Center Color Guard and the Robert E. Bush Naval Hospital Color Guard displayed and marched the National and Marine Corps colors in the parade. Combat Center Chief of Staff, Col. James F. Harp; Col. Harold B. Eggers, commanding officer, Marine Communication-Electronics School and Sgt. Maj. Ryan W. Meltesen, battalion sergeant major, Combat Logistics Battalion 7 were among those in attendance. Lt. Cmdr. Paul Armstrong, chaplain, MCCES, gave the opening invocation to begin the parade.

3rd Light Armored Reconnaissance Battalion and CLB-7 displayed two High Mobility Multi-purposed Vehicle, two Light Armored Vehicles and a Medium

Tactical Vehicle Replacement in the parade. "It's an honor being here and representing the base and the Marine Corps,"

said Lance Cpl. Felipe Rodriguez, motor transportation operator, CLB-7. "Seeing all the veterans from all the branches of service makes it worthwhile and listening to their stories makes me proud to wear my uniform."

Veterans from every war dating back to WWII shared stories and looked at the vehicles that the Marines from CLB-7 and 3rd LAR utilize on the modern battlefield.

"It's definitely different from the stuff we had in my day," said Burton Spivack, WWII Army veteran. "It is a lot better and this equipment shows how far we have come and also the might of the U.S. military today."

The history of Veterans Day began in November 1919 when President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day, to honor the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory of WWI. In 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of troops in the Nation's history and after the brutal fighting during the Korean War, it became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

"There are a lot of people who sacrificed a lot, some even their lives, for this beautiful country," said Ken Burdutte, Vietnam War Navy veteran. "It is important to honor all of them. Seeing all of the Marines and other service members out here participating in the parade today makes me and a lot of the veterans in the crowd proud that we served and that our military is still in good hands."







Gelebrating Our heritage

he Marine Corps was born on November 10, 1775 in Tun Tavern, a small Philadelphia pub. On that day, the Continental Marines were established with the intended purpose of being able to fight for independence on land and at sea. Over the years the Marine Corps has evolved into a force capable of defending its people and providing humanitarian aid to the nation and its allies from air, land and sea, all while maintaining itself as a force in readiness.

"Being a Marine is something I take pride in, and that is instilled in us from day one," said Sgt. Maj. Abel Leal, Headquarters Battalion Sergeant Major. "We are warfighters and the way we operate is very unlike the other branches. I'd like to think every Marine has some of our values instilled in them."

Since the Marine Corps' inception it has been known as the nation's force in readiness. Marines are recognized by the way they train, the customs they uphold, and the morals that are instilled in them. Although the organization continues to grow, many of the customs have remained the same. The Marine Corps' birthday is one of the many traditions that Marines take great pride in celebrating annually.

"The ball is a tradition that we celebrate every year," Leal said. "I bring a family member to the birthday ball because they don't understand it in the same way [Marines] do. But when they see all the ceremonial events in it; the moment of silence for our fallen brothers, the reading of Gen. John A. Lejeune's birthday message and the passing of the cake from

the oldest Marine to the youngest, they get to share in the pride that we feel."

Although tradition is something Marines hold dear, there was a time when the birthday wasn't always widely celebrated. In 1921, Maj. Gen. John A. Lejeune declared November 10, an official Marine Corps holiday. Since then, whether it was a small celebration between fellow comrades while deployed or a grand affair while in garrison, Marines have taken the time to honor the Corps' illustrious history.

"I love the Marine Corps Birthday," said Sgt. Maj. Ray Wilburn (ret.), veteran of World War II, Korea and Vietnam. "It doesn't matter where you are or how many Marines you're with. Two Marines can celebrate it with a cup of water while deployed and it will still have the same meaning."

The Marine Corps Ball has been regarded as a time-honored tradition that celebrates the birth of the Corps. It is a night that provides Marines from all generations with a chance to come together, recognize the sacrifices made by those who came before them, and celebrate a proud heritage.

"It's nice to celebrate the birthday in fancy venues, but we shouldn't get wrapped up in that," Leal said. "We should focus on celebrating our birthday for the heritage and tradition that comes with it."

The birthday is a day that does more than celebrate a beginning. For Marines it signifies much more. The birthday stands for a day when those from all generations, who swore an oath to protect and serve, can join as one to share in the pride of being a United States Marine.

Steve Jobs was a digital pioneer and technological entrepreneur whose ferocious drive and tenacious zeal for perfection lead to companies, products and services that today define much of the world's lifestyle: Mac computers, iTunes, iPhones, iPads, iPods and Pixar movies.

But Jobs wasn't successful right off the bat—and his life wasn't nearly as sleek and smooth as the clean, uncluttered lines of a thin, new iPhone.

"I'm poorly made," Jobs (Michael Fassbender) confesses to his head of marketing and longtime business associate Joanna Hoffman (Kate Winslet) in Steve Jobs, the sprawling new biopic directed by Danny Boyle based on former Time magazine editor Walter Issacson's 2010 bestseller.

His former partner, Steve Wozniak (Seth Rogen), comes to agree. "Your products are better than you are," he tells him.

The movie begins in 1984 at an event heralding the launch of Jobs' Macintosh computer, which turned out to be an overpriced, underpowered flop and ended his career at Apple, the California computer company he started in his garage in the 1970s with Wozniak. The film continues through two other "acts," also around product launches: Jobs' NeXT cube, in 1985 (another flop), and then the 1998 unveiling of the iMac, which marked his triumphant, full-circle return to Apple.

Director Boyle, an Oscar winner whose previous work includes Slumdog Millionaire and 127 Hours, keeps things moving at an almost breathless pace and uses three different types of film (grainy 16mm, standard 35mm and crisp, high-def digital) to define each of the movie's trio



of distinctive segments. The screenplay by Oscar-winning screenwriter Aaron Sorkin is full of the smart, savvy, rata-tat-tat dialog that made The Social Network, Moneyball and the TV shows The Newsroom and The West Wing zip and zing.

As the man at the center of it all, Fassbender portrays Jobs across a span of three decades and masterfully summons the powerful gravity that pulled other objects into his orbit—as well as the icy, distant chill that pushed most people away, including his daughter, Lisa (played at three different ages and stages by Makenzie Moss, Ripley Sobo and Perla Haney-Jardine), by former girlfriend Chrisann Brennan (Katherine Waterson).

Jeff Daniels, a Sorkin mainstay, plays Apple CEO John Sculley, and Rogen steps outside his usual stoner-comedy roles as Wozniak, who comes to resent his former partner's arrogance and hubris, his dismissive treatment of everyone who was ever close to him, and his rise to rock-god-like stardom.

Jobs—who died in 2011 from complications of a pancreatic tumor—may have been a tech and marketing genius, but Steve Jobs makes it clear he could also be a colossal jerk. To gazillions of Apple product uses, however, he became a guru, if not a messiah. Maybe that's why Doyle's closing shot—with Jobs bathed in blinding light, beaming, walking slowly into the camera before disappearing into a wash of white—looks so much like a resurrection.
