The Combat Center's Career Resource Office and Education Office hosted an Education and Career Fair at the West Gvm aboard the Combat Center, March 23.

More than 46 employers and 27 educators provided Marines and sailors information on their respective organizations and schools to prepare them for their transition out of the armed services and into the civilian workforce.

"Whether someone does four years or 20, every service member will eventually get out of their respective branch of service," said Virginia Sulick, program manager, Career Resource Office. "They should be preparing for that transition. They would not go to war unprepared and in the same sense, they should not go into the rest of their lives unprepared."

In accordance with Marine Corps Order 1700.31, Marines are required to attend the one-week Transition Readiness Seminar 12 to 14 months before their End of Active Service or 12 to 24 months prior to retirement but no later than 180 days prior to EAS or retirement. TRS provides exposure to opportunities in transition, career, and employment assistance to active duty, reserve component and eligible family members through the

Combat Center participates in Distracted Driving Awareness Month

April is distracted driving awareness month and while most people may know that texting while driving is a dangerous behavior, many don't fully grasp the idea that using the infotainment system in your vehicle while driving is also risky. The National Safety Council helps to dispel a few myths that may blind you into believing it is safe to use your vehicle infotainment system while driving.

Our vehicles are now more connected than ever. It seems the automakers are in an arms race to put the latest technology into our vehicles so we can text, email, update social media and even make dinner reservations from our dashboards. But keep in mind that just because these systems are available does not make them safe to use while driving.

Myth: My car came with an infotainment system, so since it's built into my car it must be safe.

Fact: Marketing for these technologies has been powerful. A NSC survey found that more than 50 percent of drivers believe this myth - that infotainment systems must be safe to use because they are built into cars. But technologies that allow drivers to make handsfree calls, dictate texts or emails and update social media have not been thoroughly tested. Existing research shows these systems can be distracting to drivers. In fact, The AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety found drivers doing some voice tasks via infotainment systems may remain distracted for as long as 27 seconds after they finish the task.

Myth: I know distracted driving is dangerous, but my job depends on me being connected - even when I'm behind the wheel. I can't afford to miss calls, emails or See Driving pg. A6

Ultimate Weapon, Aggressive Marine

HUE/PHU BAI, Vietnam — A certain amount of aggressiveness is essential in all walks of life. In a combat situation it is paramount.

Pvt Daniel R. Lopez (San Fernando, Calif.) a rifleman with "G" Co, 2nd Bn, First Marines, has more than his share of this aforementioned quality.

While with his unit in on operation New York, seven miles southeast of here, that aggressiveness paid off. The net result was one dead Vet Cong...what could have been a bottleneck was broken... and only Lopez was wounded when more of his fellow Marines could have been.

While sweeping north toward a blocking force the unit was crossing a rice paddy. Lopez had a feeling there were enemy on the other side of a rice paddy dike 30 yards to his front. He charged the dike, leaped over it, and turned and

fired when he spotted a VC lying in a trough on the reverse side.

The VC threw a fragmentation grenade which exploded a few feet away from Lopez, sending fragments into his chest and right leg. If the 20-year-old Marine hadn't displayed the type of aggressiveness synonymous of the Marine in combat, the VC would conceivably have lobbed the grenade into the oncoming Marines before they arrived at the dike, resulting in more casualties for the unit.

Lopez, who has three year Marine Corps service and seven months in Vietnam considers himself "pretty lucky" to be just wounded. "I could have been killed," he said.

But his aggressive quality didn't suffer a setback. "I'll be back shortly," he said. People who know him tend to agree.



The Department of the Navy is actively engaging growth of Science Technology Engineering Mathematics education to meet the Navy and Marine Corps' need to inspire the next generation of scientists and engineers.

In accordance with the DoN's mission, the Combat Center Library unveiled plans to implement STEM technology to be available for service members, patrons and students at the Combat Center Library, March 22.

"There's a vision for the Combat Center Library to become more of a hands-on learning center," said Pfc. Wesley Sweeney, volunteer, Combat Center Library. "We're creating a [STEM lab] to generate interest in STEM fields in both the community and the Marine Corps."

The library has implemented STEM tools including a 3-D printer, Little Bits (electronic circuits), and 3-D design software applications.

"You can create something you might find in a 3-D animated film, export your creation and 3-D print it," Sweeney said. "It's bridging the gap between the designer and the engineer."

According to Jeff Fourier, branch head, Personal and Professional Development, the library will officially open the STEM lab to the community near the end of June.

commander, Company B, 3rd LAR. "We went up against a thinking enemy, composed of conventional and unconventional forces, tasked with defending an area."

The Marines of Company C acted as the opposition during B Co.'s assault on Gay's Pass training area. Over the first few days of the exercise, they challenged B Co. with a variety of scenarios ranging from notional improvised explosive devices to armed adversaries.

"The assault on Gay's Pass gave us great insight on how to take on a thinking enemy and to adapt our plan to a changing battlefield," Richardson said. "Within the company, we have 18 different military occupational specialties that allow us to conduct a wide array of operations. We can load everything up on our [light armored] vehicles and operate three to five days without much support due to our versatility." Upon completion of the first portion of MCCREE, the company moved on to a live-fire and maneuver exercise. Instead of living, breathing enemies, the Marines set their sights on targets and conducted an assault over open terrain.

"The second stage transitioned to live fire with movement to contact while fighting mechanized infantry before moving on to an assault on Range 210," Richardson said. "We're not always going to have the luxury of fighting in open terrain or be able to fight where the enemy is. Often times, the enemy is going to be in urban terrain so we have to prepare for that environment."

The location of MCCREE's culminating event, Range 210's Military Operations in Urban Terrain facility, provided B Co.'s riflemen the opportunity to dismount from the vehicles and conduct building clearing operations.

Targets, designed to fall when fired upon, gave the Marines the feeling of fighting a tangible enemy.

"At first, there were internal issues the Marines had to work through," Sgt. Maj. Marcus A. Chestnut, battalion sergeant major, 3rd LAR. "It's always interesting to see them come out here and overcome those issues. At the end of it, it all worked out and I think they did very well."

Richardson also expressed satisfaction with the results throughout the evaluation exercise as well as confidence in the Marines combat readiness.

"We've gone through a lot to get where we are now," Richardson said. "The Marines have come a long way and we're a more cohesive fighting force because of it. As we are now, I'm fully confident that we can step down range and take on any enemy that we may encounter."

Fact: Car crashes are the #1 cause of workplace deaths. Safety-centric employers know that employees are their greatness asset and it is wise to go above and beyond to keep employees safe. One way employers are doing this is by implementing cell phone policies banning handheld and hands-free for all employees and creating a culture that encourages employees to embrace safety. Essentially, employers are making it easier for employees to put their drive first.

Dozens of Fortune 500 companies have adopted cell phone policies. Not only is this an added level of safety for employees, but it protects employers from being held legally responsible if an employee is involved in a distracted driving crash.

Myth: Most car crashes are caused by car malfunctions such as faulty brakes, blown tires or engine problems.

Fact: Vehicle problems are not th

resent a very small portion of crashes and most vehicle problems have to do with improperly inflated or maintained tires. More than 90 percent of all crashes are caused by driver error and can be prevented.

We know distraction can lead to driver error and we know distracted driving is common. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, 9 percent of drivers are talking on cell phones while driving at any given daylight moment. Distracted drivers also miss seeing up to 50 percent of what is around them, including pedestrians, bicyclists, traffic signs/signals and other vehicles. Engaging with infotainment systems in vehicles is dangerous not just because they take our eyes away from the road, but because these systems take our attention away from the task of driving.

Avoid the dash to the dashboard. Dashboard infotainment systems allow drivers to stay connected, but just because we can do something, doesn't mean we should.


He wrote as follows:


With fond moments we have shared, I wish you a most blessed Easter."




