Family, friends and respected colleagues gathered for the retirement ceremony of Col. Andrew R. Kennedy at Lance Cpl. Torrey L. Gray Field April 15.

Kennedy most recently served as director of the Tactical Training Exercise Control Group. As director, Kennedy was responsible for overseeing the execution and evaluation of units conducting training aboard the Combat Center.

"If you look at his [biography] you will see a passion for training Marines,"

said Maj. Gen. Lewis A. Craparotta, Combat Center Commanding General. "It started at [the School of Infantry], but most of it took place right here at the Combat Center."

Throughout his 30-year career, Kennedy honorably served multiple commands. He served as the operations officer for 2nd Marine Regiment as well as the commanding officer of 3rd Battalion, 4th Marines, 7th Marine Regiment, deploying in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. Kennedy also held various positions at TTECG, to include combined arms instructor and director of

Marine Aviation Weapons and Tactics Squadron One conducted a Non-combatant Evacuation Operation exercise aboard the Combat Center April 15.

MAWTS-1 conducted the NEO exercise as part of Weapons and Tactics Instructor Course 2-16. The WTI course is used to provide Marines with advanced tactical aviation training to certify them as weapons and tactics instructors for their units. WTI is a seven-week course consisting of 18 academic training days followed by the flight phase which consists of 25 training days where they apply their skills to various scenarios.

Each weapons and tactics instructor averages more than 90 days every year providing support to their respective units including certification, standardization, and supplementary ground and airborne instruction.

"Making the exercise as close to real life as possible helps prepare Marines for if they have to perform an evacuation like this," said Sgt. Rafael Sanchez, role-player, Tactical Training Exercise Control Group.

The exercise spanned from Marine Corps Air Station Yuma, Ariz. to the Combat Center. As the aircraft landed, Marines of 3rd Battalion, 6th Marine

Seven MEB plays big part in Combined Arms Exercise 6-89

begins here on Sunday through May 16. Third Battalion, 7th Marines, (3/7), of the 7th Marine Expeditionary Brigade (7th MEB), will be the Ground Combat Element (GCE). Simultaneously, the command elements of the 7th MEB will conduct Phase III Battle Staff Training (BST).

The CAX has three phases: a pre-CAX training phase, a live-fire phase, and a debrief phase. It provides training and evaluation, for the battalion, in all aspects of combined arms operations, including command and control, maneu-

ver, and fire support. Training begins at the fire team level and peaks at the company level with the Mobile Assault Course with a force-on-force engagement using MILES equipment, and culminates with the live-fire phase, incorporating all elements of the Marine Air Ground Task Force.

Objectives for the battalion include: conducting the exercise during periods of darkness Support Group 15.

Combined Arms Exercise (CAX 6-89) and reduced visibility; exercise electronic counter-to-counter measures capabilities; to be able to conduct the exercise in nuclear, biological, or chemical environments; to exercise command and control procedures, integrating maneuver and fire support, while operating from the mobile facilities such as assault amphibious vehicles, UH-1 helicopters, and HMMWV's; and exercise and refine procedures for obstacle and breaching and clearing in a mechanized warfare environment.

Phase III BST will be structured as a MEB STAFFEX/War game and will be conducted from May 5 to 11. During the pre-CAX period, Sunday to May 6, the GCE commander will be LtCol. T. Hannigan, CO, 3/7. During the BST training and live-fire portion of the CAX the GCE commander will be Col. J. Oster, CO, 7th Marine Regiment.

The Aviation Combat Element (ACE) commander will be LtCol. W. Blackshear, and will consist of detachments from MEU Service

> I grew up in a little place called Mount Vision in Central New York.

>l come from a big family: 6 boys and 6 girls. Because of the differences in age, the older kids had a little more responsibility and I think that was a good thing for us.

>It was an interesting place to grow up and it was fun because there was always something to do and somebody to do it with in a family that size.

>My parents are great people. They were very hands off with us as kids and they weren't overly worried about what might happen. >We were farm people. My dad had acres and acres of gardens and we were always busy pulling weeds, harvesting crops or cutting flowers. There were horses, cows, chickens and all kinds of ridiculousness going on. It was a fun place to grow up.

>My father was a counter intelligence officer in the U.S. Army for a period of time. He was an enlisted man who went to [Officer Candidate School] and was doing his reserve time because he had a family and was running his business.

>He was a big reason why I joined the military. He would always say "there's no harm in having some military service."

>Because of his greenhouse business, my father was gone a lot. My mother was always in charge and she was very serious about things. She had more influence on my character development of anyone because of the way she ran our family.

>The work ethic I have is definitely to her credit because as a kid I was tough to corral.

>l can remember one summer my older brother and I didn't score well on a standardized test, so we had math tutoring every day for the whole summer. It was horrendous; I didn't want that to happen ever again so, I developed a good work ethic and had a healthy respect for how worthwhile it would be to me.

>After high school, I attended Cornell University and I majored in floriculture. The program at Cornell was famous and it accommodated us greenhouse guys.

>The purpose of college for me was to gain a degree in something I would do for the rest of my life. At the end of my first tour in the Marine Corps I remember calling my father on the phone and asking him if he was ready for me to come home. His response was "I can't pay you what you're worth. You should stay in the military for now."

>It's a very civilizing influence to have a family and

children. They make me a lot more human. I think it's extremely important for children to have the right influences growing up so they can become members of society that are valued, and that makes you think of the way you present yourself.

>I thought once I got married I would get out because you don't want to put your family through the kind of craziness that involves moving once every couple of years. Well it turned out they like it.

>Whenever my family and I moved, my books traveled with me. Everywhere we went there were books stacked waist high along all the walls. We moved again and my wife said to me "If those books don't have a shelf, they're going away," and I thought "Oh no, my books!" So I got a circular saw and a power screw driver and I built some book cases. The shelf didn't look that good, but it was the beginning of my interest.

>l'm always learning new things and figuring stuff out. Because of this, I developed an interest in building things. It was also partially out of necessity with my books.

>I think it's worthwhile to reflect on things and think of what you've learned. Periods of reflection aren't all bad, I just think you shouldn't dwell on it.

>**I always say** the best part of my life is tomorrow. I don't know what's going to happen, but it's going to be something great.

>It seems like yesterday I was at the basic school figuring out what it was like to be a guy at the thin end of the whip and now, I'm here. It's pretty astonishing looking back to think [30 years] passed by in the blink of an eye.

>I have indelible memories of time spent with guys excelling at really hard things. That's the Marine Corps, the 'get it done' guys who won't quit and won't except anything less than the best from everyone.

>Some guys I worked with showed me what it really meant to be a Marine and I've gotta tell you, it's fun being around those kinds of people and watching them work.

>When I reflect on the best parts of being in the Corps, I think about the men I served with. We did some really hard, crazy things but the Marines always came through, they never disappoint. And that's the special thing about Marines, that's what it all really comes down to.



Substance Abuse Program hosts scavenger hunt

With impaired vision, a Marine stumbles toward his vehicle, scrambling to find the seat as he falls into position. He searches frantically for the handles as he begins operating the vehicle, unknowingly crashing into the other drivers. His beer goggles slightly slide off his face as he tries to beat other racers on his tricycle to the finish line.

The tricycle race was the first portion of the Substance Abuse Program's Scavenger Hunt at Del Valle Field April 15.

SAP organized the scavenger hunt to educate Combat Center service members on the dangers associated with substance abuse. One example is the beer goggles, which simulated the effect alcohol has on vision and how it can affect the safe operation of any vehicle.

"If service members don't know what the dangers are, they won't know what to look out for," said Carleen Dickson, substance abuse specialist, SAP. "Having that knowledge is what's going to keep them from making those high-risk choices."

The scavenger hunt started with seven teams of two running around the Del Valle track with tricycles, either riding or carrying them while wearing vision

impairing goggles. Afterward, they went on a scavenger hunt through mainside to search for different clues about substance abuse prevention programs. Participants found clues in ammo cans, which lead to the next location. Locations include, the Education Center, the SAP Office, Robert E. Bush Naval Hospital, and the Career Resource Office.

"People have problems and sometimes they don't know how to get help until it's too late," said Lance Cpl. Elijah Kelly, rifleman, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment. "It's important to know where the resources are."

Participants collected various items at each of the stations during the scavenger hunt and had to beat their competitors back to the starting point to win the event. Cpl. Jimmy Carter, rifleman, and Pfc. James Swain, motor transport operator, 2/7, won the event. Leaders from SAP presented the pair with a plaque for their victory.

"If they learn about substance abuse prevention now, they will pass the information to other people," said Staff Sgt. Jason Syvrud, substance abuse control officer, 2/7. "It's like any other life lesson. If they learn it while they're young, they can guide others when they're older."





TOUGH MINDED **OPTIMISM** by Lou Gerhardt



"After researching the daily habits of wealthy people for five years", author Thomas C. Corley found that they avoid one type of person at all costs: pessimists.

"Self-made millionaires are very particular about who they associate with," Corley writes in his book, "Change Your Habits, Change Your Life." "You are only as successful as those you frequently associate with. The rich are always on the lookout for individuals who are goal-oriented, optimistic, enthusiastic, and who have an overall positive mental outlook.'

Eighty-six percent of the rich people in his study made a habit out of associating with other success-minded individuals. On the flip side, "they also make a point to limit their exposure to toxic, negative people," he explains.

The importance of substituting negative friends and acquaintances for positive individuals stems from the fact that positivity was a hallmark of the rich people he studied - and we emulate the people we associate with.

"Long-term success is only possible when you have a positive mental outlook," Corley states.

He's not the only one to suggest that negativity derails success - or that your relationships could affect your financial success.

Nearly a century ago, journalist Napoleon Hill drew similar conclusions after researching over 500 self-made millionaires. "Men take on the nature and the habits and the power of thought of those with who they associate," he wrote in his 1937 bestseller, "Think and Grow Rich," and "there is no hope of success for the person who repels people through a negative personality.

The bottom line: Negativity will derail you from pursing success, and like attracts like. Avoid the pessimists and start hanging out with the optimists."





It's big, all right, epic and operatic. Who wins? I certainly won't spoil it.

Except to say the real winners will be viewers who keep eyes totally glued to the screen for the split second just before the screen goes dark and the credits roll.






