Combat Center honors day of remembrance

BIG BEAR LAKE, Calif., – Celebrations honoring the fallen soldiers of the Civil War began the year after the war ended in 1866. Once known as Decoration Day, Memorial Day was established as a federal holiday meant to unify the celebration as a national day of remembrance. On Monday, Combat Center leadership visited ceremonies throughout the community and dedicated their Memorial Day to the remembrance of America's fallen

Center as the guest speaker in the Memorial Day Ceremony at 29 Palms Cemetery. He began his address to community members in attendance by speaking about the beginnings of Memorial Day and the importance of keeping it alive in the minds of our citizens.

"On that first Memorial Day the graves of soldiers, both union and confederate, buried at Arlington Cemetery were all decorated with flowers and flags," Craparotta said. "For more than 150 years, Memorial Day has stayed relatively the same. We must ensure as a country that we don't let the real meaning of Memorial Day slip away. It's critical to the core of this country that we continue to recognize the extraordinary efforts of hundreds

Leathernecks in Vietnam have new radar...it smells them out

DA NANG, Vietnam— Marines in Vietnam are enjoying phenomenal success with a new kind of radar they're using to ferret out the Viet Cong.

It's not the kind of radar that goes "beep, beep." It's a vicious kind that snarls and growls and makes even the toughest enemy solider cringe in fear.

Scout dogs.

They are being used by Marines

for the first time in combat since WWII. There are 30 of them in the 1st Marine Scout Dog Platoon, commanded by 1stLt Robert V. Wilder (Philadelphia, Pa.).

In their first month of operational activity in Vietnam, the scout dogs have:

Led to the capture of almost 100 Viet Cong suspects; uncovered nearly 50 booby traps; found several enemy weapons as well as a great deal of Viet Cong rice and clothing; and even discovered batteries used to detonate mines and booby traps.

"That's a pretty good score when you figure we're just starting," says Wilder, a former rifle platoon commander.

The dogs and their Marine handlers arrived in Vietnam in March after three months of training together at Fort Benning, Ga. The first month here was devoted

to acclimatizing the dogs to the intense heat, which often soars well beyond 100 degree Fahrenheit.

The scout dogs went into action for the first time in April.

Since then they have participated in numerous combat and reconnaissance patrols. They also have been used on major operations, and have even been used on night listening posts beyond Marine lines.

MARINE CORPS AIR STATION YUMA, Ariz. — Tactical Training Exercise Control Group conducts the Long Range Raid exercise at the Combat Ville training area as part of the 28-day Integrated Training Exercise held aboard the Combat Center three times each year.

The exercise requires detailed planning and integration between ground and air combat elements. According to Sgt. Christopher McDowell, assistant engineer instructor, TTECG, the exercise gives the units involved an opportunity to practice the necessary planning and integration required for long range raid operations.

"The Long Range Raid requires good communication and planning with multiple combat elements in order to work successfully," said 1st Lt. Joseph Livi, scout sniper platoon commander, 2nd Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment. "The Marine Corps is especially suited for this kind of mission because of the flexibility of the [Marine Air Ground Task Force]. By coordinating with the different aspects within the MAGTF, we can execute an operation like this independently."

The exercise starts at Marine Corps Air Ground Combat Center, Twentynine Palms, Calif., where a ground assault force is transported via rotary wing aircraft from the Strategic Expeditionary Landing Field to the Combat Ville, a military operations on urban terrain training area at MCAS Yuma. Upon arrival the unit assaults the simulated town and accomplishes key objectives in a predetermined time frame.

"The training we provide for Marines who come to the Combat Center is as realistic as possible and we are always trying to make it even better," McDowell said. "We use Marines as role players to give the units training a real opposing force to train against. TTECG brings the training to life."

The role players use simulated firearms and improvised explosive devices to defend the notional town. The unit sends a small team of scout snipers to collect intelligence on the enemy's movements and actions the day before the raid takes place, giving the assaulting force the critical information before the raid commences.

After the exercise the members of TTECG meet with the training audience's leadership to discuss their assessment of the unit's planning and execution of the exercise.

"We provide the best training for the Marines who come through ITX," McDowell said. "We train Marines faster, safer and more completely. If more Marines come home at the end of deployments we have accomplished our goal."

CTB hosts Classroom to **Career Day**

Communication Training Battalion partnered with Girl Scouts of San Gorgonio Council to host the Classroom to Career Day aboard the Combat Center May 26. CTB and the Girl Scouts organized the event to enable youth toward professional development and foster community relationships.

More than 70 middle school students came to the Combat Center from San Bernardino and Riverside County to get a first-hand look at careers offered in the Marine Corps and Navy. Career volunteers from eight base organizations including Robert E. Bush Naval Hospital Twentynine Palms, Marine Corps Communication-Electronics School, and 23rd Dental Company, escorted the girls through their providing advice.

"It's important to educate the girls on every opportunity so they can make the best decision for their opment and foster community relationships. future," said Sgt. Kelsey Marvel, chief investigator, Provost Marshal's Office.

Many career day volunteers gave the girls insight on military careers to help make an informed decision on joining the military, college, or the workforce.

"I learned a lot talking to the [Marines and sailors]," said Rosario Garcia, 14, student. "It's good to see all the options I have."

Lt. Col. Rhesa Ashbacher, Combat Center Staff Judge Advocate, and Lt. Col. Erin McHale, commanding officer, Combat Logistics Battalion 7, led the Power Lunch portion of the event, which was focused on providing the girls with career knowledge and confidence through casual conversation.

In its second year, the Classroom to Career program has grown to involve 20 different schools and has educated more than 2,000 girls. The program has visited businesses organizations throughout Southern California, but this was the program's first visit to a military installation.

"We want to show the girls some careers they probably would never think of," said Carrie Raleigh, Science Technology Engineering Mathematics program manager, Girl Scouts of San Gorgonio. "It's also exciting for the girls to come out and see some of the females who've emerged as leaders and the roles they're taking on."

Hendges went on to discuss the hardships that the family members of the fallen endure and the noble sacrifices service members make in order to keep the scars of combat outside of America's doors. He concluded his address with the importance of remembering the ultimate sacrifice so many American service members have paid.

"Conflicts are won but the fallen are never forgotten," Hendges said. "While the debt from those who gave their lives can never be repaid, our appreciation is reflected in how we honor and remember their sacrifices."

French, U.S. come together during Memorial Day ceremony

BELLEAU, France— Marines from 6th Marine Regiment and the 2nd Marine Division band traveled to Belleau, France, to pay tribute to those who made the ultimate sacrifice, alongside their French Allies during a Memorial Day Ceremony, Sunday.

Belleau Wood is the location of a bloody battle that occurred during WWI 98 years ago, in which the lives of many French and Americans were lost while combating against German soldiers. Though there was carnage around every turn, U.S. Marines never gave up fighting for themselves and for their French brothers-in-arms, eventually earning the nickname "devil dogs" from the Germans.

"They had never encountered an enemy as fierce as the German Army—a professional, veteran fighting force equipped and supported by modern weaponry," said Gen. Robert B. Neller, commandant of the Marine Corps. "When the Marines emerged from the Wood twenty days later, bloody but victorious, they were transformed forever... The Marines who fought at Bois de Belleau left an enduring mark on our Corps. Their dogged determination has become the stuff of legend."

Guests of both French and American descent attended the event to honor the military members who fought valiantly to protect their rights and freedoms throughout history.

"Today we gather to honor the memory, the service, and the sacrifice of all the men who fought here, side-by-side, for liberty—Marines, Soldiers, American and French. We return here annually to remember them and be fortified by their example, and to rededicate ourselves to the ideals they died for," Neller said.

On either side of the Americans and French participating in the ceremony are the graves of thousands of military members from both countries who have died upholding the values of their nations.

Each year, citizens and service members gather together to remember the fallen from WWI, the Battle of Belleau Wood, and every other fight since.

"This day bears witness to the indestructible ties that unite U.S. and French service members," said Lt. Gen. Francis Autran, representing the chief of the French Army. "These links are strong. They are deeply-rooted in the history of our two countries. The have forged the brotherhood-in-arms we see today to honor the memory of these heroes surrounding us and that of all who have fallen since then, in every theater of operations where we have been and where we still are deployed side by side."

Captain Crunch

The Marvel gang's all here in superhero-packed mega-movie

'Captain America: Civil War' Starring Chris Evans, Robert Downey Jr., Sebastian Stan & Scarlett Johansson Directed by Anthony Russo & Joe Russo Rated PG-13

What do superheroes do when they're not saving the planet? A lot of the same things everyone else doesthey prattle around the house, do their best to get along and sometimes get on each other's nerves.

"Who's putting coffee grounds in the disposal?" Iron Man (Robert Downey Jr.) asks his houseguests, which include Captain America (Chris Evans), Black Widow (Scarlett Johansson), Scarlet Witch (Elizabeth Olsen), War Machine (Don Cheadle) and Vision (Paul Bettany). "Am I running a bed and breakfast for a biker gang?"

Crammed into a back of a tiny VW Beetle, the hulking Winter Soldier (Sebastian Stan) has a request of Falcon (Anthony Mackie). "Could you move your seat up?" Like a grumpy sibling on a family road trip that's already over-stretched his patience, Falcon isn't exactly in an agreeable mood. "No!" he snaps.

Captain America: Civil War is a big, sprawling superhero mega-movie, with more spandex to the gallon than any flick that's come down the pike in a long time. The latest in the multi-billion-dollar Marvel cinematic canon, it's officially the third of the Captain America franchise, but it's also a continuation of the Avengers movie arc, and it ropes in characters from other Marvel movie properties as well, including Iron Man, Ant-Man (Paul Rudd) and even the new Spider-Man (Tom Holland), whose movie won't be in theaters until next summer.

The "Civil War" in the title refers to the major rift that occurs within the Avengers when a United Nations panel wants to rein them in. The global community is concerned about the civilian deaths and wakes of destruction that accompany the superheroes' badguy smackdowns—a theme that also cropped up a few weeks ago in another comics-character slugfest, Batman v Superman.

The Avengers divide into two camps about the issue—those who feel that some international oversight and cooperation is the way to go (led by Iron Man), and the rebels who refuse to sign the accord (team Captain America). That sets the stage for several spats, a couple of subplots, more than two hours of squabbles and one stupendous battle royale in an abandoned airport.

Directors Anthony and Joe Russo keep things moving along with style, substance and significant flair, and they give all their characters time to shine—no easy task when they are so many, including newcomers Chadwick Boseman as an African prince who becomes the Black Panther; Marissa Tomei as Peter Parker's Aunt May; and Daniel Brühl as the Eastern European über-villain Zemo. There's also Jeremy Renner as Hawkeye, Martin Freeman as a CIA official, Emily Van Camp (from TV's Revenge) as Sharon Carter, and William Hurt as the U.S. Secretary of State. Oscar-nominated Alfre Woodard pops in as an aggrieved mom.

But through it all are the Avengers, the world's coolest, most powerful cadre of superfriends—family, actually—being ripped apart, fractured from within, pulverizing each other as the divide between them, widened by treachery, becomes filled with distrust, dark secrets and deep wounds from the past.

There's a whole army of frozen Winter Soldiers, a funeral and a sweet kiss between two characters that may point to future romance.

How does this wham-bam, jam-packed road trip on the superhero highway end? I won't spoil it. But you shouldn't be surprised to know that even when it does, it doesn't, and that the Marvel movie map is still being drawn for Captain America, Iron Man, Spider-Man and other characters for years to come!
