'Island Warriors' conduct NEO exercise aboard Combat Center

As members of the nation's force in readiness, Marines may be tasked to evacuate U.S. citizens abroad in a time of crisis. To prepare, Marines with Marine Aviation Weapons and Tactics Squadron One from Yuma, Ariz., conducted a Non-combatant Evacuation Operation exercise aboard the Combat Center, Oct. 14, as part of Weapons and Tactics Instructor Course 1-17.

"This training gives Marines important handson experience," said Sgt. Justin Viola, team lead, Tactical Training Exercise Control Group. "The Marines have to identify possible threats in a local populace while evacuating Americans."

The five-hour exercise began at Marine Corps Air Station Yuma, Ariz. Marines of 2nd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment, were transported in MV-22 "Os-

prey" tilt-rotor aircraft and CH-53 "Super Stallion" helicopters before arriving at the Combat Center, where they conducted a simulated rescue of approximately 140 U.S. personnel and local nationals, played by role-players with MAWTS-1 and TTECG. "Each of the role-players has a specific motive and background story," said Cpl. Brandon Wards, role-player, TTECG. "This allows us to get into character and challenge the Marines' decision-making."

The exercise required aircraft to conduct evacu-

ations at three locations across the installation — Lance Cpl. Torrey L. Gray Field, Del Valle Field and Range 220. During the operation, Marines conducted screenings on all evacuees before transporting them to by aircraft back to

Ambulance drivers: the unsung heroes

He received the call at about 2:30 a.m. ... There has been a car accident; two men and two women are hurt, one of the men appears in serious condition. Forgetting his fatigue and concentrating on the problem at hand, he - the ambulance driver - gets behind the wheel of his vehicle with the corpsman at his side and they drive off with flashing lights and sirens wailing.

In those few precious moments between the time the ambulance is called and it arrives, someone's life may hang in the balance and the decision whether he lives or dies rests mainly on the driving ability of the ambulance driver and the cooperation he gets on the road from

Lance Cpl. Douglas A. Jones, a truck driver who once transported ammunition to artillery batteries before volunteering to be an ambulance driver comments, "I like my work. It's different. The biggest problem I have while I'm on the run, especially on Code, is people not moving out of the way." Code is an expression used by ambulance drivers which means driving on the emergency run with flashing lights and sirens blaring.

The observation made by Lance Cpl. Jones of the discourtesy drivers not acknowledging the flashing lights or the siren is expressed by the other drivers. Cpl. James Edward Jones, a man who has driven an ambulance for a year, says, "Many times they refuse to give us the right of way. This is time consuming and dangerous. Then people complain about the time we take to get to the scene of the accident."

In general, the attitude of all the ambulance drivers is unanimous toward their work which they view as not only interesting but highly rewarding. Their greatest feeling of accomplishment is seeing "their" patient walk out of the hospital and continuing this life which was interrupted by an unfortunate accident.

"Their" patient?

Yes, in his own way, the ambulance

driver feels that he has contributed to relieving the pain and suffering of the patient by getting him to where he can receive expert medical care.

As for the relationship between the Naval corpsman and the Marine driver, there is no interservice friction for even though both feel a certain pride in their own service they feel it is out of place in a situation where a person's life is in danger. Cpl. Gary K Lambert, an ambulance driver for two and one half years, expressed full and complete confidence in his corpsman of the Base Hospital saying, "I'll drive anywhere, any time, and under any condition with them. They really know their job."



WHAT I'VE LEARNED

Ben Philadelphia, Pa. Corporal, commanding general's driver

MILLS WAS SELECTED TO BECOME THE COMMANDING GENERAL'S DRIVER IN APRIL. While in high school, he RAN TWO MARATHONS AS PART OF A RUNNING PROGRAM IN PHILADELPHIA, PA.

> I grew up in Philadelphia, Pa. My family is big, but I've only interacted with a few of them. I have an older brother, an older sister and a younger sister, but I only grew up with my sisters.

- > I'm very close to my sisters. Growing up, my older sister always helped my mom take care of us.
- > I grew up eating chips, cookies and all manner of junk food. By the time I got to high school, I knew I had to become healthier so I wanted to get into a sport. I was too short for basketball, I was too short for football and I knew I wasn't going to do anything else so I thought I might as well try out for track and field.
- > I ran a few minor events but the two that I'm most proud of are the two marathons.
- > When I first started track and field, I was really bad so I quit. After I stopped track, I joined a marathon running group. The training was progressive. When I first started, we would run two miles every day for a month. If our trainer saw improvement they'd increase the distance. I was in the group for about two years. It was a lot of fun, but it was really taxing.
- > Growing up, I didn't have my dad **around** so my uncle became my father figure. He was the one who made sure I was disciplined, and that I got good grades in school. He made me read a lot. He punished me by making me read books.
- > My uncle taught me that I needed to be respectful, reliable and intelligent. I needed to improve myself in some way every day. If you go a day without improving, then you're just wasting your life.
- > My uncle was the type of person who was very intelligent, but he made a lot of mistakes. You could tell he wished he didn't make those mistakes, so he tried to prepare me for the world. As a kid, I resented that. Now that I'm older, I appreciate what he did for me.
- > When my uncle left I thought, "I can do whatever I want now." I started hanging out with my friends and doing what I pleased. At the end of high school, I had a bunch of scholarships to go to college but at the time, I didn't think I was smart enough to go.
- > The mentality in my family is "get a job so you can help pay bills." It's all about surviving, making money and helping out. I didn't want that, so I tried to get a job, but no one would hire me.
- > I was almost 19, still living with my mom, with no job. I knew if I didn't do something I'd waste my time and I had to make money somehow, so I decided to join the military.
- > I attempted to take the [Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery] with the **Army six times,** but for one reason or another I was never able to. There was always the Marine Corps recruiter right there, guaranteeing they could do a better job.



- > When I got promoted to the rank of corporal, my whole idea was to lead, but still be myself. Still do what's required of me but don't forget who I was before I came here.







Tears wash over 'The Light Between Oceans'

"The Light Between Oceans"

Starring Michael Fassbender, Alicia Vikander and Rachel Weisz

Directed by Derek Cianfrance PG-13

"With the ocean, anything is possible," says Tom Sherbourne (Michael Fassbender), the stoic World War I veteran who takes a job on a remote lighthouse island 100 miles off the coast off Australia in director Derek Cianfrance's adaptation of Tom Isabel's 2012 romantic novel.

It sure seems like anything is possible in The Light Between Oceans, in which a sea of happiness and an ocean of tears wash over the characters before it's over, all because of things brought in by the endless ebb and flow of the tide.

Blissfully alone on the barren island, Tom and his new young wife from the mainland, Isabel (Alicia Vikander), try to start a family. But two wrenching miscarriages leave Isabel an emotional wreck. Then one day, a small open boat washes ashore. In it is a dead young man-and a crying baby girl.

Tom dutifully prepares to telegraph the mainland Isabel made their joyous

to report the tragic incident, but Isabel begs him otherwise: She wants to keep the child and raise her as her own. "We haven't done anything wrong!" she pleads. It's a sign, a blessing, surely not just a coincidence, she says. Tom reluctantly relents, buries the corpse and pushes the empty dingy out to sea.

The repercussions of Tom and Isabel's morally questionable act ripple across the waves when they come home for a visit with their little "Lucy" and meet a grieving woman in the village (Rachel Weisz) whose husband and baby daughter were lost at sea... in a rowboat...at about the same time Tom and

discovery on the beach. Uh-oh.

How this all comes together, and becomes even more complicated and crushing, is at the heaving melodramatic heart of the story, which goes beyond its soap-opera surface with some deeper, darker themes and things to ponder. Tom's lighthouse is situated between the warm Indian Ocean and the colder Antarctic waters on an island called Janus Rock, named for the two-faced Roman god of

great oceans that cover the Earth, all things are connected-past, present and future; grief and happiness; war and peace; life, love, loss and death.

Cianfrance isn't known for making lite-and-lively movies. There are no real shining rays of sunshine in Oceans, but the photography is often sumptuous and sweeping, and Fassbender and Vikander do look cool in vintage 1920s garb. And there are some very strong performances, particularly from Vikander and Weisz, whose character enters late in the plot but becomes essential to the movie's message about what can happen when righteous anger gives way to forgiveness.


