As an ongoing effort to be the premier self-sufficient expeditionary force, the Marine Corps is striving to make itself leaner, meaner and "greener" as it takes a look at energy use across the Corps, equating the efficient use of vital resources with increased combat effectiveness.

The Marine Corps' Expeditionary Energy Office held an Energy Capability Exercise at Camp Wilson, Tuesday, in alignment with the Great Green Fleet initiative, to highlight different efforts and technologies the Corps has developed to promote a more energy conscious force.

GGF is a year-long, Department of the Navy initiative that demonstrates the sea service's efforts to transform its energy use. As one of the Secretary of the Navy's key energy goals, the purpose of the GGF is to make our Marines and sailors better warfighters, able to go farther, stay longer and deliver more firepower.

"2016 is the year of the Great Green Fleet, highlighting the energy efficiencies in both installations and operations in the Navy and Marine Corps," said Col. Bryan Magnuson, director, Marine Corps Expeditionary Energy Office. "Today, we are demonstrating operational energy technologies that allow the Marine Air Ground

The Corps needs decisive, confident leaders

For the first time in NCO school history, an NCO presented the graduation speech to the graduating class of NCOs, Oct. 27.

The commanding officer of Detachment A was selected to be the speaker for the Oct. 27 graduation. Sgt. Barry Ladner, a specialist in the Marine Corps Integrated Maintenance Management System, was the "acting" commanding officer for NCO Day. Therefore, by virtue of the billet Ladner was holding, he spoke during the ceremony.

"We've been promoting NCO Day, and debating how much leadership we should give the

NCOs. After careful consideration, we decided there should be no limits," said Lt. Glenn Johnson, Maintenance Management officer. "The first NCO Days were done by the most senior NCOs. This time, we chose the ones who stood out. Sgt. Ladner did, and he was chosen to represent the detachment."

Ladner spoke to the class about their need to seek responsibility and be aggressive in training their troops. "The troops will always look to you for guidance," said Ladner. "Be bold in making decisions, and don't be afraid to make mistakes, making mistakes is all part of being a leader."

Ladner said that boldness is an essential morale trait which generates combat power – initiative is a prerequisite for boldness.

"I feel it's really important to get good leadership back in the ranks of the NCOs," said Ladner. "I want to help motivate NCOs to take leadership; to rebuild NCO confidence in themselves."

"Everyone who heard the speech was very impressed said GySgt. Karl Bullock, chief instructor of the NCO school. "He is one of the best speakers we've had here."

Ladner's motto for the NCO day was "NCOs Must Make It Happen." "Don't be afraid to make decisions. NCOs must believe in themselves and continue to be faithful to God, country, and Corps."

TOUGH MINDED **OPTIMISM** by Lou Gerhardt



Lalo Alvarez attends my Thursday seminars on positive living. He is vice-president of A.C.T. Tours and has visited more than 130 countries. I asked him to share this story.

When I came to America from Mexico, I knew I would not be able to go back and see my beloved mother until I got a Green Card, a legal process which would last 14 years. I spoke to her over the phone, of course, but I longed to hug her, to kiss her cheek and again taste her homemade Mexican food. Mom's tamales, especially, were delicioso. So when the Green Card finally arrived in early December, we both planned for my return to Mexicali, where I was raised. There was just one problem: I owned a store and could not leave until after Christmas.

My siblings had warned me that Mother was failing in health, but she assured me she was fine and eagerly looked forward to our reunion. December 24, I packed the car with \$1000 in gifts-

this would be one unforgettable fiesta! Then the call came-Mom had been rushed to a hospital and physically died of a stroke shortly afterward. Shattered, I drove all night to Mexicali and joined by heartbroken family who had gathered to pay their final respects to the mother of 14 children. Afterward, when I was alone with my grieving father, he looked at the unwrapped gifts I had brought and said, "Your mother made you a present, as well, and left it in the kitchen." Inside the refrigerator was a plate of tamales, with a note attached that read, "Welcome home, my dear son Lalo. Feliz Navidad."

Task Force to go further on the same amount of energy. We have representatives out here from the office of the Secretary of Defense; the departments of the Navy, Air Force and Army; and Marine leadership to include general officers and commanders."

Navy Secretary Ray Mabus chose the name Great Green Fleet to honor President Theodore Roosevelt's "Great White Fleet," which helped usher in America as a global power on the world stage at the beginning of the 20th Century. Likewise, GGF will usher in the next era of DON energy innovation.

Expeditionary Energy Office intends to change the way the Marine Corps employs energy and resources to increase combat effectiveness and reduce need for logistics

support. "We take a look at the Marines Corps' future requirements and how to fulfill those requirements," Magnuson said. "We are focused on a multitude of capability sets from vehicles currently in use such

as the Medium Tactical Vehicle Replacement] to make it go further on the same amount of energy, as well as different commercial technologies to make [Marines] more effective."

In order to find the best technology for the future of the Marine Corps, the Expeditionary Energy Office has reached out to commercial industry through technical field demonstrations.

"We go out to industry and we say, 'Here are our challenges, what do you have out there that can help us?" said Capt. Michael Herendeen, science and technology analyst, Marine Corps Expeditionary Energy Office. actively search for those sorts of things. One of the challenges is to make sure what we are buying is good so we make sure Marines have hands on to test products before we invest."

According to Magnuson, field artillery cannoneers with 3rd Battalion, 11th Marine Regiment, have already put to use a Ground from sea and sustain com-

Electronics Network System, a hybrid energy power system, which utilizes solar panels and high energy density batteries to be more sustainable in a deployed environment. This has allowed them to go totally off the grid, without having to haul a large generator through arduous terrain.

"[The system] provides the same power that Marines would normally need to idle the truck for," Herendeen said. "Instead of burning fuel to power the cannon's computer and communication systems, we can plug it into the green system and not need to consume that fuel or cause a need for additional maintenance on the truck."

In 2012, the Commandant of the Marine Corps identified Expeditionary Energy as one of the six pillars of modernization in the Marine Corps. The Expeditionary Energy Office is working toward a Marine Expeditionary Force that can maneuver Renewable Expeditionary mand control communi-

cations, computer, intelligence and life support systems in place, with more efficient mobile systems requiring less liquid fuel.


"The future force is going to be much more energy intensive, so we need to understand how we use our energy," Magnuson said. "Right now, Marines don't know how we use our fuel other

than with the E and the F gauges. When we give Marines that information, they make it possible to implement change within the MAGTF."

In line with the Marine Corps' Future Operating Concept, they will put things in the hands of small units to allow them to be self-sustaining in respect to energy and water so we

don't have to take on the risk and logistics of moving fuel and water around the battlefield. Marines will sustain the fight in a more distributed environment.

"If you run out of energy, you can't do your mission," Magnuson said. "If we can go further with the same amount of energy, we can be much more agile on the battlefield."



Pearl Harbor White Boat Crew reflect on 75th anniversary

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii — "I've been looking forward to this moment for quite a while now, and it's finally near," says Petty Officer 1st Class Wren Pettett, of Atoka, Oklahoma. "You always hear so much about the history of Pearl Harbor, but to actually be a part of that history..."

His voice trails off as he tries to find words that describe his emotions. Over his shoulder, the sun begins to set behind the Battleship Missouri Memorial, and to his right, the USS Arizona Memorial. Each day, Pettett has the honor of driving one of the white boats that tour the waters of Pearl Harbor, as visitors from around the world come to pay their respects and learn about the history that lives in infamy after that fateful December day in 1941.

Today, Pettett drove around perhaps the most important kind of visitor: the survivors of the Pearl Harbor attacks and their families, here to honor the 75th anniversary of one of the United States' darkest days. For the young Oklahoman, he expressed that "opportunity of a lifetime" doesn't begin to justify the honor.

"Every day, when I'm driving one of these

boats and we go by the resting place of the USS Oklahoma, the USS Utah and the USS Arizona, the humbling feeling of honor and privilege I feel to take people around this beautiful harbor is indescribable," says Pettett. "But to have the honor of driving a boat carrying survivors of the Pearl Harbor attacks for the 75th anniversary...it brings a new kind of self-worth to this job. It makes me happy to be alive in this moment, to serve at this particular moment in history."

As the survivors and their family members make their way onto a white boat, moments from reuniting with the memories of a day long past but never forgotten, Seaman Erwinn Garrett, of Houston, Texas, renders honors to a Medal of Honor recipient. He then helps a survivor in a wheelchair get up the brow. A gentleman's wife appears and he helps her aboard and then to her seat. For him, this isn't his job or duty. It's his way to say thank you and pay his respects to the sacrifices these men and their families made almost eight decades ago.

"This is my first duty station," says Garrett. "When I found out I was coming to Pearl Harbor right out of basic training, I

was elated. I knew it meant I'd be here for the 75th anniversary, and that's a once in a lifetime opportunity for anyone, not just a service member."

Garrett, like Pettett, says he needs a moment to take in the fullness of his day, with the survivors, before he can accurately describe its impact on him.

"If there's one thing I've learned from the survivors here these last few days, it's that there really is no shipmate that gets left behind," says Garrett. "These men didn't just work together; they lived together and died together. And for them to come back year after year, decade after decade, to honor their fallen shipmates, it sets a precedent for any generation of our Navy."

The survivors take their seats and the boat pulls away from the pier. A light rain begins to fall as the tour makes its way out past historic, Ford Island and heads first towards the USS Utah Memorial. Chief Petty Officer Michael Sears, from Clatskanie, Oregon, the narrator for this tour, immediately lets the survivors know how grateful the Navy is for their service and sacrifice. Sears has voluntarily narrated this tour dozens of times in the past, but this one holds special meaning.

"I previously worked in public affairs here in Hawaii and I've always helped out with the white boat tour narration, because it's a fun thing to do and the atmosphere is always good," says Sears. "I do this because, to me, history will be repeated if it's not known. The time we spend with these survivors and learn about the things they had to endure in their time of service is the only way that we'll ever honor their sacrifice and prevent this kind of attack from ever happening again."

Αt the Arizona Memorial, the survivors and their families return to the resting place of the 1,177 Sailors who lost their lives during the attacks on Pearl Harbor and Oahu. Some weep openly, while others pray silently to their fallen friends. Others

embrace and share memories of how much the area has changed since they were stationed here, all those years ago. One survivor stands before the wall of names, at the end of the memorial, and points out the names of men he may have known during his time of service. Nearly 75 years after a day that would help define their entire lives, these men came back to pay their respects to those who never lived past that day.

"It's surreal, when you try to take it all in," says Seaman Anthony Ruiz, of Lake Havasu City, Arizona, one of the ushers on the white boat tour. "This 75th remembrance has given my career a new meaning going forward. These veterans are why we're here

today, why this country is as great as it is today and why our Navy is the best of its kind. It's because of them, and the sacrifices they've made. To just have the chance to show my appreciation for that and to be a part of this anniversary is something I'll remember for the rest of my life."

As evening colors are rendered and the sun dips under the Pacific horizon, the white boat eases off the dock of the memorial and heads back to land. Survivors and active duty Sailors sit next to one another and share some of their adventures. Some look back at the memorial and wave to their fallen shipmates.

It isn't goodbye. It's a salute to their timeless sacrifice.





Naval Hospital Twentynine Palms conducts point of dispensing exercise

Corpsmen of Naval Hospital Twentynine Palms and the Adult Medical Care Clinic held a point of dispensing exercise at the Marine Corps Communication-Electronics School aboard the Combat Center, Tuesday through Thursday.

During the three-day exercise, corpsman administered the required influenza vaccine to approximately 3,000 Marines. The point of dispensing exercise simulates a large distribution of medication in a short amount of time during a simulated pandemic.

"We conduct the point of dispersion exercise every year," said Navy Lt. Stephany Harris, environmental health officer, NHTP. "The training allows us to practice being able to distribute medication and vaccines in the event a pandemic were to happen. At the same time, we are able to provide as many Marines as possible at MCCES their required flu vaccine."

Corpsmen who participated in the exercise spent several hours distributing the flu vaccine to the Marines several hundred Marines a piece.

"We are really completing two of our requirements for the year with one exercise," said Seaman James Bryantshock,
