

PMO aims to halt speeding on base

Here at the Combat Center, it is our mission to not only conduct training that prepares our fighting forces for what they may encounter while forward deployed, but to ensure the best possible quality of life for Combat

Center patrons and all who call our installation home. In order to ensure the safety of pedestrians, drivers and children, the Combat Center is beginning its first phase of a zero-tolerance speeding policy, which will be outlined in Combat Center Order 1630.8F, the new guidance on traffic safety.

“The speed limit in all residential areas is 15 mph because we have children, pets and family members who live in the housing areas,” said Lt. Donald Albers, chief traffic crash investigation officer, Provost Marshal’s Office. “15 mph gives you enough time to avoid an object [or

person] in the road, but if you exceed the speed limit it can reduce your reaction time and that’s when it becomes a hazard.”

Per the direction of Brig. Gen. William F. Mullen III, Combat Center Commanding General, Combat

Combat Center promotes Eagle Eyes program

In today’s world, many threats around us remain at large. However, there is a program used throughout the Marine Corps which can help prevent potential offenses. That program is called Eagle Eyes and it gives members of the Combat Center community the tools needed to keep themselves and their loved ones safe.

Eagle Eyes is a website designed to serve as a terrorism and terrorism-related crime “neighborhood



watch” program created to promote community awareness and involvement. It gives service members on and off the Combat Cen-

ter the ability to identify preliminary indicators of a potential attack and report them.

“The purpose of Eagle

Eyes is an anti-terrorism and anti-criminal tool used by the community,” said Michael Burns, Combat Center force protection supervisor,

G-7 Mission Assurance. “With this tool the community can call in suspicious activity to help put a stop to any criminal activity.”

According to Burns, the Department of Homeland Security created the program to raise public awareness of indicators of terrorism and terrorism-related crimes, and to emphasize the importance of reporting suspicious activity to the proper authorities.

“After someone reports suspicious activities the information gets reviewed and then used to ‘connect the dots’ to any other activity that may have happened,” Burns said. “There

Former DI, Toma is tough on drugs

David Toma, a celebrated lecturer, crime-fighter and former Marine drill instructor, spoke with 1200 area teenagers in the Yucca Valley High School Gymnasium Tuesday about the danger of drugs and alcohol and asked for commitment in fighting drug addiction on high school campuses.

The program attracted students, parents, counselors and administrators from throughout the high desert, including many from the Combat Center.

"My mother was a loving and caring woman. She often went down to the jails to talk to and pray for inmates. That stuck out in my mind," he added. "It made me more committed."

The commitment led Toma

to become a Newark, N.J., police officer at the age of 21. "I wanted to help people and get the scum off the streets. No one cared about the police I tried to save. All they (the police department) wanted were arrests," Toma said. "The more you got, the better in their eyes you were."

After five "unhappy and frustrating years," Toma set his sights on becoming a detective. His exploits as a detective are well documented in two television shows, Toma and Baretta.

Toma stressed to the overflowing crowd that it is not what is said that makes a difference but how it is said. "I'm here because I love you, and I know what I'm talking about."

After the two-hour presentation, Toma challenged the audience to help each other, and

stop using drugs and alcohol.

He returned 20 minutes later to explain the horrors that he has seen drugs cause. "I remember one day police entered a home and a man was sitting in a chair stoned. He couldn't talk, he just made a jerking motion. They continued to search the house, and in the kitchen a woman stood at the oven. Upon closer examination, they discovered that this woman had cooked her infant," he said. "Only drugs can make you do something that stupid."

He gave a few more examples of drug-induced, irrational behavior that received sighs of disbelief and disgust from the audience. But the major thrust behind the encore discussion was to let teenagers know that the first step in fighting drug

and alcohol addiction is admitting the problem exists.

He also suggested that getting rid of questionable "friends" helps. "If you hang around garbage long enough, you start to stink," he said.

The highlight of the morning came when students who were former drug and alcohol abusers approached the stage and spoke with their fellow students. Tearfully, a 14-year-old girl told the audience how her marijuana smoking almost destroyed her family. "I hurt the people I love, especially my little sister and brother. I'm getting it back together, because I love them; and I want them back," she said.


Toma had reached his audience and given high desert teens something to think about. "I think he helped to

change some people's points of view," said 16-year-old Dawn Haaq of Twentynine Palms High School. "Drugs are not glamorous, Toma definitely showed that."

"I think he got people to sit back and analyze themselves. Using drugs and alcohol is a decision that can ruin your life," said Carri Pecorella, a junior at Twentynine Palms High School. "Toma stressed that people shouldn't let others influence them."

According to Toma, drugs are not the problem. People are the problem. "When we are concerned for each other, give the right examples, and learn to love each other and ourselves, we won't have a generation of young people turning to artificial stimuli. We'll be 'high' on life."

>Before I joined the Marine Corps I did a lot of skateboarding. Now that I have more time, I have gotten back to doing it again. I thought that it would be hard but I got right back on the board like I never got off.

>Cooking is another thing that I have gotten into. It's an entertaining thing to do and I enjoy it. I did learn how to make sushi, which is cool.

> I didn't really have a person who made me want to join the military but I knew that I wanted to join the military. I joined the Marine Corps very soon after high school. No one really affected my decision to join. I didn't know there was a difference between any of the branches. I wanted to join the military and the Marine Corps contacted me, which is why I chose them, oddly enough.

>I started getting really into swimming once I joined the Marine Corps. I thought that I should practice it so that I would be able to use it if I needed to. I wanted to be strong enough to save someone if the time ever came.

>I ended up with a [military occupational specialty] in intelligence. It was a good experience but I knew that it was not something I could keep doing. I did get to learn about the different places and topics that I wrote about. It was interesting to learn about those things.

>Shortly after I joined, I got married and my wife and I spent my entire time in the Marine Corps here in Twentynine Palms. I had known my wife for about 12 years before we got married.

>We love it here. We are both from a city and when we came out here it was like everything slowed down.



Building things and creating things have always been one of my favorite things to do. >Right after I got out of the Marine Corps, the base asked if I wanted to work for them doing some of the background checks. I took the job and it wasn't until about a year later that I met a person who worked at the co-generation plants.

I get to learn about different machines that I work with. I asked what I needed to do to work here and he said that I could come by and learn about all the different things that happen at the co-gen plants.

>I went every day to learn about all I could. One day they started looking for people who wanted to work at the plants and I got the job. I couldn't have been happier.

>This is the best job I could ask for to start my career in engineering. I have been able to look at turbines and various other objects that I find awesome.



> I plan to keep working here until I can save up enough to go to Japan and go to college for engineering. There is a great college that I can study engineer-

ing there. Also, a large amount of new things are made there. Everything is engineered and I want to be around that for at least a while.

President Trump has over 25 million followers on social media. He frequently uses this platform to advocate for conservative causes, Republican candidates and to educate the public on the failures of the Obama administration. 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Today, the 45th President of the United States was sworn into office. Here are some of the initiatives President Trump plans to tackle during his time in office.

Foreign Policy and Defeating ISIS

- o Peace through strength will be at the center of our foreign policy. We will achieve a stable, peaceful world with less conflict and more common ground.
- o Advance America's core national interests, promote regional stability, and produce an easing of tensions in the world.
- o Ensure our security procedures and refugee policy takes into account the security of the American people.
- o Work with our Arab allies and friends in the Middle East in the fight against ISIS.
- o Pursue aggressive joint and coalition military operations to crush and destroy ISIS, international cooperation to cut-off their funding, expand intelligence sharing, and cyberwarfare to disrupt and disable their propaganda and recruiting.
- o Establish new screening procedures and enforce our immigration laws to keep terrorists out of the United States.
- o Suspend, on a temporary basis, immigration from some of the most dangerous and volatile regions of the world that have a history of exporting terrorism.
- o Establish a Commission on Radical Islam to identify and explain to the American public the core convictions and beliefs of Radical Islam, to identify the warning signs of radicalization, and to expose the networks in our society that support radicalization.

National Defense

- o Work with Congress to fully repeal the defense sequester and submit a new budget to rebuild our depleted military.
- o Increase the size of the U.S. Army to 540,000 active duty soldiers.
- o Rebuild the U.S. Navy toward a goal of 350 ships, as the bipartisan National Defense Panel has recommended.
- o Provide the U.S. Air Force with the 1,200 fighter aircraft they need.
- o Grow the U.S. Marine Corps to 36 battalions.
- o Invest in a serious missile defense system to meet growing threats by modernizing our Navy's cruisers and procuring additional, modern destroyers to counter the ballistic missile threat from Iran and North Korea.
- o Emphasize cyber warfare and require a comprehensive review from the Joint Chiefs of Staff and all relevant federal agencies to identify our cyber vulnerabilities and to protect all vital infrastructure and to create a state-of-the-art cyber defense and offense.
- o Pay for this necessary rebuilding of our national defense by conducting a full audit of the Pentagon, eliminating incorrect payments, reducing duplicative bureaucracy, collecting unpaid taxes, and ending unwanted and unauthorized federal programs.

Veterans Affairs Reform

- o Ensure our veterans get the care they need wherever and whenever they need it. No more long drives. No more waiting backlogs. No more excessive red tape. Just the care and support they earned with their service to our country.
 - o Support the whole veteran, not just their physical health care, but also by addressing their invisible wounds, investing in our service members' post-active duty success, transforming the VA to meet the needs of 21st century service members, and better meeting the needs of our female veterans.
 - o Make the VA great again by firing the corrupt and incompetent VA executives who let our veterans down, by modernizing the VA, and by empowering the doctors and nurses to ensure our veterans receive the best care available in a timely manner.
- Donald J. Trump's 10 Point Plan to Reform The Department of Veterans Affairs
1. Appoint a VA Secretary whose sole purpose will be to serve veterans. Under a Trump Administration, the needs of D.C. bureaucrats will no longer be placed above those of our veterans.
 2. Use the powers of the presidency to remove and discipline the federal employees and managers who have violated the public's trust and failed to carry out the duties on behalf of our veterans.
 3. Ask that Congress pass legislation that empowers the Secretary of the VA to discipline or terminate any employee who has jeopardized the health, safety or well-being of a veteran.

 6. Create a private White House hotline, which will be active 24 hours a day answered by a real person. It will be devoted to answering veteran's complaints of wrongdoing at the VA and ensure no complaints fall through the cracks.
 7. Stop giving bonuses to any VA employees who are wasting money, and start rewarding employees who seek to improve the VA's service, cut waste, and save lives.
 8. Reform the visa system to ensure veterans are at the front of the line for health services, not the back.
 9. Increase the number of mental health care professionals, and allow veteran's to be able to seek mental health care outside of the VA.

44th President Barack H. Obama

In the Illinois State Senate, he passed the first major ethics reform in 25 years, cut taxes for working families, and expanded health care for children and their parents.

President Obama and his wife, Michelle, are the proud parents of two daughters, Malia and Sasha.

The Obama Administration

- o VA has dramatically increased access to care for our veterans, completing approximately 57.84 million appointments from June 2015 through May 2016, and completing nearly 97% of the appointments within 30 days.
- o Authorized a strike in Pakistan that resulted in the death of Osama bin Laden, the leader of al Qaeda.
- o VA has increased its total clinical work by 10% over the last ten years. That translates into roughly 20 million more hours spent providing care for veterans.
- o Ended the combat mission in Iraq.
- o 90% of veterans surveyed are either "satisfied" or "completely satisfied" with the timeliness of their care.
- o Ratified a landmark nuclear arms treaty with Russia, New START.
- o VA has reduced the disability compensation backlog by nearly 90% over the last three and a half years, taking the number from a high of over 610,000 to under 80,000 today.
- o Overall veteran homelessness has decreased by 47% since 2010, and unsheltered homelessness has decreased by 57%.
- o Developed a comprehensive new strategy on Afghanistan and Pakistan and authorized deployment of more than 33,000 "surge" troops to Afghanistan.

Center patrons who are caught speeding in residential areas will face serious repercussions.

"Anyone who is caught driving between 16-19 mph [in a residential area] will be issued a citation with a traffic court date," Albers said. "Anyone who is caught going 20 mph [in a neighborhood]

or higher will have their driving privileges suspended for 30 days on the spot. The individual will be asked to park their car and someone else who can drive aboard the installation will be asked to remove the vehicle."

Combat Center residents are also encouraged to keep in mind

the speed limits of 25 mph on main roads, 35 mph on Del Valle and 45 mph toward Camp Wilson as well as the policies regarding tailgating and pedestrians' right of way explained in existing CCO 1630.8E.

According to CCO 1630.8E, the Combat Center's motor vehicle and traffic regulations will

conform to the California Vehicle Code which states that "the driver of any motor vehicle, prior to driving over or upon any sidewalk, shall yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian approaching thereon."

"Make sure that regardless of where you are, you're practicing

safe driving," Albers said. "Don't be an aggressive driver and ensure you're keeping a safe following distance from the person in front of you. The speed limits were established for a reason. Speeding on base will affect not only the lives of the person caught, but those around them."

are a lot of people who use social media to talk about what kinds of suspicious behaviors they see. Eagle Eyes gets that information to the correct people first and faster."

For all those who reside

aboard the Combat Center, Eagle Eyes aims to enhance security awareness and improve the understanding of terrorist and criminal pre-attack surveillance and intelligence collection operations.

"It's a great tool," Burns said. "The more people we have using it the better it becomes. Members of the community can call or use the website to send any information they have through the Eagle Eyes

program and it helps us keep an eye out for any potential dangers."

Burns claims it is essential for everyone to understand that reports made on Eagle Eyes can effectively prevent a terrorist or major

criminal attack from happening.

"The Combat Center has limited resources," Burns said. "Extra 'eyes and ears' help us keep all the people aboard the installation safe. If you have a gut feel-

ing that something seems out of place, go to the website and report it."

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PWD works to improve Combat Center

On New Year's Eve, amidst the festivities, anticipation and delight of ringing in a New Year, the Combat Center lost its power during a lightning storm. After lightning struck a power pole, the Publics Works Division sent five professionals to fix the problem, requiring them to leave their homes and celebrations to bring power back to the residents of the Combat Center. In less than two hours, they found and repaired the problem.

"There are a lot of things that could go wrong during a lightning storm," Grubbs said. "It can be dangerous for the people repairing the issue, but regardless of the fact, they worked as fast and efficiently as they could to bring the power back."

The goal of the Publics Works Division is to continuously improve the installation's infrastructure and facilities to make the Combat Center a rewarding and satisfying place to live and work. The PWD teams responds to problems caused by aging infrastructure and works to ensure the quality of life for Combat Center patrons by fixing those issues as quickly as possible.

"The people at PWD are always going out to fix one issue or another," said Glenn Grubbs, deputy public works officer, PWD. "Plenty of different buildings deal with loss of cooling units or an issue with getting power to the buildings. We want to fix that."

Recently PWD began a micro-grid expansion project to better distribute energy throughout the Combat Center. This micro-grid will allow the installation to stay powered if the flow of electricity from Southern California Edison, the utility serving the Combat Center and surrounding communities, is disrupted.

"This micro-grid will allow the base to go into island mode," said Gary Morrissett, utilities and energy

management supervisor, PWD. "This mode will make the base completely self-sufficient with its power supply. Since we would be able to function without SCE, we would no longer have to worry about losing power. We could continue to function even without an outside energy source."

PWD has also purchased a 650T portable chiller that can be used to keep buildings cool while work is done on the cooling units.

"We bought the portable chiller so that buildings can stay at a comfortable temperature while we work on their cooling systems," Morrissett said. "Because we have a limited number of people to work on the problems that arise on base, we need to ensure that when we work on a problem we do it quickly while keeping everyone as comfortable as possible."

How my electric bill pays me


Like most people, I dread having to pay the electric bill, especially during the summertime. That's why I thought it sounded too good to be true when Lincoln Military Housing announced that I could get paid for being energy efficient. I was skeptical at first, but after a month of deliberately reducing our energy use, the bill arrived- not with an amount due, but with a check inside.

This is an incentive included in the Resident Energy Conservation Program. Implemented by the Department of Defense in 2012, it is the driving force that encourages military members to practice energy conservation while living in privatized family housing. Since its inception, the program has made progress in achieving its goal of reducing DoD residential energy consumption in the U.S. by 20 percent.

RECP's first study of the program's effects on energy consumption was measured at Marine Corps Base Hawaii. The program helped reduced energy consumption there by nine percent over a 12-month period, saving the base approximately 1.3 million dollars in energy costs in 2012, according to RECP.

The program works by placing homes in like-type groups. This means that energy use is gauged and compared to the average energy use of homes with similar square footage and age.

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My bill indicates our monthly usage, and indicates whether we fell in one of three categories: less energy used, the grace zone, or more energy used.

If monthly energy use falls in the less energy used portion, you receive a

payment or credit. If I land in the grace zone, I don't pay anything, and if I am in the more energy used category, I pay the remaining cost.

The program has made me and my wife more conscious of our energy con-

sumption. Here are some helpful tips that can make a difference in saving energy:

- Only wash full sets of laundry and dishes.
- Use a power strip to cut all power to electronics. Many continue to draw a small amount of power when they are switched off.
- Keep the thermostat between 78 and 80 degrees in the summer and between 65 and 68 degrees in the winter.
- Keep blinds, drapes, or shades closed in the summertime. During the wintertime, open them.
- Whenever possible, keep unnecessary lights, televisions and other electronics off. These generate heat as well, and at the same time use unnecessary energy themselves.
- Switch to Compact Fluorescent Light bulbs.



NO. 1 PLASTICS

PREP: quick rinse • no lids
CRV Plastic (soda/water bottles)

NO. 2 PLASTICS

PREP: quick rinse • no lids
milk/water jugs, juice bottles

ALUMINUM & STEEL CANS

PREP: empty and rinse out food and beverage residue

PAPER & CARDBOARD PRODUCTS

Copy paper, white ledger paper, shredded paper, newspaper, magazines, telephone books and all types of cardboard

GLASS CLEAR/BROWN/GREEN

PREP: empty and rinse out food and beverage residue

CARDBOARD

The Combat Center preserved nearly 7,000 gallons of oil by recycling cardboard!

ALUMINUM

Each month the Combat Center preserved over 50,000 kWh of energy by recycling aluminum!

PLASTIC

The Combat Center preserved approximately 1,600 cubic yards of landfill space by recycling plastic.

PAPER

The Combat Center saved over 6 trees a day by recycling paper!

TIRES

The Combat Center recycled approximately 17,000 tires, preserving roughly 1,000 cubic yards of landfill space.

LEAD-ACID BATTERIES

The Combat Center recycled almost 100 tons of lead-acid batteries which is the most recycled product in the United States.

ELECTRONIC WASTE (E-WASTE)

The Combat Center recycled over 30 tons of e-waste in 2016.

STEEL

Each month the Combat Center preserved over 1 trillion Btu's of energy by recycling steel!

BID SALE PROGRAM

The Qualified Recycling Program (QRP) bid sales are typically conducted once a quarter and are open to EVERYONE! Individuals can view the bid sale inventory by visiting the Residential Commercial Recycling Section (RCRS) at Bldg. 2085 T1 on Rifle Range Rd. or visit www.green29.org. If you wish to sign up for the upcoming bid sale please come visit RCRS.

Bid sale items may consist of:

- Scrap metal (ferrous and non-ferrous)
- Scrap wood, including unusable/unserviceable pallets and crates
- Scrap plastics
- Appliances (unusable/unserviceable)
- Used furniture (non-repairable, unusable/unserviceable)

The proceeds generated from the QRP bid sales can help fund the following efforts aboard Marine Corps Air Ground Combat Center (MCAGCC).

- Recycling initiatives
- Energy conservation projects
- Pollution abatement
- Occupational safety and health activities
- Moral, welfare, and recreational projects

Reutilization program

The QRP enables MCAGCC units (ONLY) to reutilize items or materials at no cost to the command. Typical reutilization items may consist of:

- Desks
- Chairs
- Pallets
- Tables
- File cabinets
- Ammo cans

HAZARDOUS WASTE

Lead acid batteries, used motor oil, light bulbs, paint, aerosol cans, and used antifreeze can all be recycled and should be disposed at Hazardous Waste Management Branch (HWMB).

E-WASTE RECYCLING

Old, obsolete and non-functioning TVs, computers, monitors, printers, toner cartridges and other miscellaneous small electronic equipment can be turned into the HWMB for proper recycling.

NON-RECYCLABLE ITEMS

Aluminum foil, pie pans, etc., compact disks, wax paper (milk boxes, frozen food cartons), plastic no. 3, ceramic glass (plates, bowls, cups), styrofoam and rubber products (latex gloves) cannot be recycled aboard MCAGCC.

The QRP bid sale and reutilization program directly supports the installation's goal to meet executive order recycling mandates. QRP operations are conducted in accordance with local & federal laws, regulations and Department of Defense policies and instructions.
