7th MEB infantry squad finishes third in 1st Marine Division contest

Representing the Combat Center, 14 Marines and one Navy corpsman from Company (Co.) C, 1st Battalion, 4th Marines finished third in the 1988 1st Marine Division Rifle Squad Competition, which was conducted at Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton recently.

During the eight-day contest, the Combat Center team pitted their combat skills and tactics against four other infantry squads to determine who was the best in the 1st Marine Division.

Squad members were: Sgt. James Niland, squad leader; Cpls. Hector Perez, Clyde Lemons, and Anthony

Cross, fire team leaders; Lance Cpls. Russell Hartsell, Patrick Pasqual, and John Johnson, automatic riflemen; Lance Cpls. Jerry Hoffpavir, Jeffrey Leedom, and Edwayne Delacruze, assistant gunners; and Pfcs. Mark Swanson, Robert Smith, and William Averett, riflemen. The Corpsman was Hospitalman Anthony Manganaro and the alternate squad member was Lance Cpl. Greg

"We were tested on our reactions during day and night offensive and defensive tactics, patrolling, ambushing, calling for fire, and negotiating through a combat endurance course while wearing full combat gear in the competition," said Niland.

According to the 25-year-old Greenbelt, Md., native, the battalion held a three-day competition to decide which company squad would go to Camp Pendleton. The contest was between Co. A and Co. C.

"It consisted of a 14-mile 'hump' in full combat gear and conducting ambush patrols and attacks," explained Niland. "All the exercises were live-fire. After it was over, we were winners."


In preparation for the divisional contest, the squad talked through each phase of an attack or patrol and then actually walked through it.

"After we went through the tactics, we would make our critiques and decide how we could make improvements," said Niland.

Niland noted that the change in terrain was a factor for his squad. "Unlike the flat land we trained on in the desert, Camp Pendleton had grass, hills and a lot of scrubbery to travel through. It definitely came into play with us," he

"We went up against some pretty competitive squads, but everyone in the squad had a lot of confidence and we



Lost & Found Guidelines

It happens from time to time; a Marine returns from unit physical training only to realize they left their wallet or ID at the track. What should they do when they return to find their item missing?

Fortunately, the Provost Marshal's Office offers a Lost and Found program for Combat Center personnel, residents and guests who have lost an important item or are trying to return valuable property to its owner.

It is important for person-

nel to know that the Lost and Found is here and they can drop off missing valuables with the Desk Sergeant. Those same items can be retrieved from the Physical Security department. For those turning in items, the Desk Sergeant is present 24/7 in bldg. 1407. For those looking to reclaim a lost object, Physical Security is available Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The majority of items turned into our office are credit/debit cards, driver licenses, wallets,

meal cards and even room keys. Occasionally, items such as jewelry and electronics are turned into our office, but may be damaged or even inoperable. Additionally, Marine Corps Community Services and the Commissary turns over Lost and Found items on a monthly basis.

If you see something missing and don't know what to do with it, please turn it into the Desk Sergeant. Items that will not be accepted are the following: clothing, disposable

objects, and anything considered to be of no value. Weapons and knives are turned into the Criminal Investigation Division for screening and then are disposed of properly.

The process for claiming an item(s) simply requires the owner to describe in detail any distinguishing markings or features. Showing a picture ID or marking the item with a name and contact information can accelerate the process for reclaiming property.

*Note: Any Common Access Cards (CAC) that are turned in are immediately submitted to the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) office in bldg. 1551. Any items that are not reclaimed within 45 days of receipt will be disposed of properly, so be sure to contact us as soon as possible.

Provost Marshal's Office encourages clean living

The Provost Marshal's Office encourages all readers to keep themselves away from the substance abuse trends of the world, which includes alcohol and narcotics, to name a few.

This month's focus is regarding the use of marijuana. As we know, the state of California approved the use and cultivation of marijuana for any persons 21 and older. However, this still does not supersede federal law, which is mandated aboard the installation and for all active duty service members, civilians and federal contractors.

Marijuana is classified as a Schedule I controlled substance. For any service member the use, possession and distribution

of marijuana is in direct violation of Article 112A, Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ). For civilians, they can be prosecuted under Title 21, Section 811, United States Code (USC). Additionally, any type of marijuana violation could land you debarment from the installation, result in negative actions with your unit/ employer and leave you with no home and out on the streets.

Understanding the effects of marijuana should be in the forefront of your mind. The use of marijuana will deter your mind from properly functioning. Just as with alcohol, it will impair you which will not allow you to operate a motor vehicle at 100%. Use of marijuana prior to

operating a motor vehicle can subject you to a charge for Driving Under the Influence, Article 111, UCMJ and in California, Vehicle Code Section 23152(e).

Prevention of these crimes all starts with knowledge in what not to do. Prevention also includes the steady mind to resist temptation of using, consuming, possessing and distributing marijuana. Abstain from groups of people who may be an influence to committing the crime. Teach your spouses, children, friends and other family members that it is a crime to be involved with marijuana. As stated previously, it could cost you your job, your career and your source of livelihood.

For further information please review Policy Letter 1-18 on the MCAGCC website, which is mandated by the Commanding General. Keep your family and friends clean, stay crime free and continue the fight.

Safety Equipment

The Provost Marshal's Office encourages the proper Protective Measures/ Equipment needed for traveling in vehicles and on motorsystem

motorcycles.

Safety equipment saves lives and helps prevent serious injuries that may occur during routine training, traffic accidents or simple trips. To help avoid serious injuries during a traffic accident be sure to properly secure yourself with seat belts. Seatbelts save more than 10,000 lives in America every year.

Be sure to know the state laws. Seatbelts are required for all drivers and passengers. The following information pertains to children:

- Children under 2 years of age shall ride in a rear-facing car seat unless the child weighs 40 or more pounds OR is 40 or more inches tall. The child shall be secured in a manner that complies with the height and weight limits specified by the manufacturer of the car seat.

- Children under the age of 8 must be secured in a car seat or booster seat in the back seat.

- Children who are 8 years of age OR have reached 4'9" in height may be secured by a booster seat, but at a minimum must be secured by a safety belt.

- Passengers who are 16 years of age and over are subject to California's Mandatory Seat Belt law.

For many, riding motorcycles is an enjoyable pastime but be sure to follow state laws and the Combat Center regulations.

- You are required to wear a helmet, shatter resistant goggles or full face shields, sturdy boots/ shoes that extend above the ankles, long sleeve shirts/jackets, long-legged trousers and full-fingered gloves.

- For those who want to conduct off-road operations, you shall have knee and shin guards, off-road boots, and padded full-fingered gloves.

When choosing to not follow the safety regulations, there are penalties that will come about. Do not find yourself on the list of people who have traffic citations, which can lead to the loss of base access.

All safety equipment is designed to deter the risk of fatality and to ensure citations are the last thing to come across your way. The Provost Marshal's Office encourages vou to follow the regulations, keep your families safe, and most importantly return home safe and in one piece. 


Whether it is children enjoying their summer vacation or Marines looking for a way to cool off while on liberty, escape from the heat can be found at the various swimming facilities on base. Swimming offers a great aerobic workout and is an exercise that challenges the swimmer, by requiring the use of the whole body.


Regardless of an individual's swimming ability, a trip to the base pool can be a refreshing and effective way to stay cool and fit during the hottest time of year.


